"I keep quite well informed upon the development of Bend and the Central Oregon country, generally by reading religiously the valuable and newsy articles of a development character which appear weekly in your interesting paper. I have never seen any paper that devotes more space to articles of this kind than yours. You are doing a great good work in this respect as these articles are of interest to the farmers and highly educational and valuable and much good will be derived therefrom I am sure."

The above letter comes to The Bulletin from F. W. Graham, the Western Industrial and Immigration Agent of the Great Northern Railway, at Seattle. The copy of The Bulletin which Mr. Graham inclosed, to illustrate how thoroughly he clips from the paper as a source of general Central Oregon information, was little more than a few shreds of paper clinging together around the space once occupied by the articles that had been cut out. It was, in fact, as sorry a sight as a supposed Taft precinct after Wilson voters had falsified.

In all the landslide of optimistic editorial comment concerning the prosperous era that lies before the nation, there appears but one sad eyed prophet of distress. The big men of the nation—financiers, manufacturers, statesmen, editors—all unite in saying that Democracy or no Democracy the economic situation is admirable, and that the country faces splendid and stable prosperity. The one distressing voice referred to is that of the Madras Pioneer. Its funeral wail is lengthy and complex. The gist of it is contained in the following opening paragraph, or epigraph:

The tide has turned in Wilson's favor, and now that we are going to live, suffer and probably starve to death during a democratic reign the time is at hand to make a prediction of this country's future.

Editor Turner was snowed under for the office of county clerk by a mere Democrat. It's just possible that misfortune has unsettled his good judgment and upset his liver. However, we sincerely hope he does not starve to death during the Democratic reign.

An otherwise interesting and valuable article in the October issue of "The World's Work" regarding the importance of good roads, contains a bit of unintentional humor and misinformation, as follows:

An interesting case occurred in the now famous Deschutes Valley in Oregon. During the summer of 1910 ** (during railroad construction) ** it was a three days' journey from The Dalles for the freight wagons to the new land, J. J. Laurendine, of Portland, and his partner purchased an automobile truck, shipped it to The Dalles, and began hauling freight. They could do more in one day than three freight wagons could do in a week. Their profits were incredible. But the advantage of the automobile truck was too obvious to the grim freight drivers on the dusty roads. In less than ten days it became too dangerous to operate the auto truck and Mr. Laurendine and his partner removed to other fields.

All of which is very instructive, particularly, no doubt, to "the grim freight drivers." The "wild and woolly" still manages to exist in the pages of eastern periodicals, if nowhere else.

The remarkable thing, after all, about this extended presidential contest, is that not the slightest evi-

dence of fear is exhibited in the business world over the anticipated election of the democratic candidate, Woodrow Wilson. This remains true despite the effort of the republicans to throw a tariff scare into the situation. There has been much broadening of apprehension throughout the country as to what business prosperity rests upon. It is recognized that the sum of the natural economic factors—the unprecedented crops, the process of readjustments in the business world by which over-extension of credits and the like have been brought back to healthy condition—make or unmake business prosperity, and that politics has slight immediate effect.

YOUNG FORGER MAKES BREAK

BOY WITH BAD RECORD AT LARGE

Ernest Kidd, From Barns, "Stings" Local Merchants and Then Gives Deputy Sheriff Slip—Said to Have Done Trick Before.

A young fellow who gave his age as 19 and his name as Ernest Kidd turned forger here last week, passing several checks upon merchants to which he signed the name of Alex Hanley. In addition to the forged signature he also endorsed the worthless checks with the names of merchants, the names of Lara, Sather and French being used in this way and each of them being "stuck" for small amounts.

Finally A. M. Lara swore out a complaint against the boy, and he was arrested by Deputy Sheriff L. L. Fox. The boy finally confessed that his name was Kidd, saying that he had been employed on the Hill Hanley ranches in Harney county. There, it seems, he had been kicked in the head by a horse, and been in a hospital a long time. According to his story—and he told an assortment—he was turned loose with no money and, coming to Bend "broke," tried the check game. He maintained that he had lost the fifty or so dollars he had secured in shaking dice. Saturday, while he was being allowed to wander around without close surveillance, alleging a desire to get legal advice, Kidd disappeared, giving Fox a clean go-by, and since has not been seen. Fox phoned to neighboring towns, but thus far no trace of the boy has been found.

Later Fox said he finds that Kidd has a bad record. While working on the streets of Burns he escaped from the marshal there. Those who saw him believe he is in need of medical attention more than anything else, as the horse kick seems to have upset his mind.

Kidd is slightly built, rather small, clean shaven, with a low forehead, and has a bad scar on the left side of his head.
