

# OTHER TOWNS PICK OFFICERS

## BURDICK IS MAYOR OF METOLIUS

Mixup at Shaniko Causes Contest—  
Madras Puts in Pierce For Mayor.  
Redmond Indorses Hosch, De-  
feating Jones for Council.

At Metolius last Tuesday the elec-  
tion resulted in a unanimous vote for  
incorporation of the city, 39 casting  
ballots for it. The total vote was  
61, with 22 women voting. The  
complete vote follows:

**Redmond Vote is 268.**  
Redmond's election showed the  
following elected, with 265 ballots  
cast:

Councilman for one year—W. G.

was defeated for the city recorder-  
ship by one vote, and now her friends  
are contesting the election on the

was in Bend for several weeks last  
summer and her husband worked for  
a short time for a local merchant.  
Mrs. Anna Magee received ten  
votes for mayor.  
The election at Paisley resulted as  
follows: C. E. Campbell, mayor, 70  
votes; for councilmen: Thayer 83,  
Moas 73, Miller 71, Currier 62,  
Hampton 61 and Conn 49.

# PARCELS POST AFTER JAN. 1

## PACKAGES UP TO 11 POUNDS MAILABLE

Country Will Be Divided Into Nine  
Zones, According to Distance, the  
Rates Varying Proportionate-  
ly—May Cheaper Express.

The new parcels post law becomes  
effective January 1, and Postmaster  
Minor is preparing to handle the lo-  
cal end of the business. Parcels not  
exceeding eleven pounds in weight  
and measuring not more than 72 in-  
ches girth and length will be trans-  
ported as fourth class mail matter.  
Rates are based on distance, the  
country being divided into "zones."  
Distinctive parcels post stamps must  
be used. They may be registered or  
accorded special delivery service. All  
parcels must bear the return card of  
the sender, otherwise they will not  
be accepted for mailing. Parcel  
stamps will be issued in denomina-  
tions of 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 10, 25, 50, 75  
cents and \$1. In the local office will  
be a big map showing the different  
"zones."

On one pound the following rates  
will hold for the different zones: Lo-  
cal rate and 50 miles, 5 cents; 50 to  
150 miles, 6; 150 to 300, 7; 300 to  
600, 8; 600 to 1000, 9; 1000 to  
1400, 10; 1400 to 1800, 11; all over  
1800, 12.

For parcels over a pound in weight  
the rate advances, depending on the  
distance. For local mailing, the ad-  
vance is one cent for each pound af-  
ter the first; for 50 miles, 3 cents;  
50 to 100, 4; 150 to 300, 5; and so  
on until for distances over 1800  
miles it is the same for each addition-  
al pound as for the first pound, that  
is 12 cents. The advantage chiefly  
of the parcels post is, therefore, in  
sending packages a short distance.  
The reductions from the present rates  
for distances over 1800 miles is 4  
cents a pound, the fourth class rate  
at present being a cent-an ounce or  
16 cents a pound.

The new postal rates are expected to  
make the express companies to  
make reductions in their charges to  
meet the competition. As yet, the  
local express office has not been not-  
fied of any change.

## DR. HOLT LIKES BEND

Presbyterian Board Representative  
Favors Loan For Local Church.

Rev. W. S. Holt, general secretary  
of the Presbyterian Church, who rep-  
resents the board of the church on  
the Pacific Coast, was here all day  
Thursday, seeing much of the town  
and its surroundings. In the after-  
noon he met the officers of the local  
church, conferring with them re-  
garding the completion of the present  
building. It is expected to have the  
new edifice completed in January,  
and it will cost, according to pres-  
ent plans, close to \$8000, instead of  
the \$5000 originally estimated.

Dr. Holt, who is familiar with  
conditions all along the coast, came  
here primarily to see if the outlook  
for local development justified exten-  
sive financial aid from the church  
board. So enthusiastic did his vis-  
it make him regarding Bend's future  
that he has unhesitatingly recom-  
mended a grant from the church  
erection fund of \$3200.

You are, therefore, further not-  
fied that the said allegations will be  
taken by this office as having been  
confessed by you, and your said entry  
will be canceled thereunder without  
your further right to be heard there-  
in, either before this office or on ap-  
peal, if you fail to file in this office  
within twenty days after the  
FOURTH publication of this notice,  
as shown below, your answer, under  
oath, specifically meeting and re-  
sponding to these allegations of con-  
test, or if you fail within that time to  
file in this office due proof that you  
have served a copy of your answer on  
the said contestant in person or by  
registered mail. If this service is  
made by the delivery of a copy of  
your answer on the said contestant  
either in person, proof of such ser-  
vice must be either the said contest-  
ant's written acknowledgment of his  
receipt of the copy, showing the date  
of its receipt, or the affidavit of the  
person by whom the delivery was  
made stating when and where the  
copy was delivered; if made by reg-  
istered mail, proof of such service must  
consist of the affidavit of the person  
by whom the copy was mailed stating  
when and the postoffice to which it  
was mailed, and this affidavit must  
be accompanied by the postmaster's  
receipt for the letter.
