Men interested in promoting San Francisco's Panama exposition in 1915, and particularly Oregon's proposed share in it, will tackle the Legislature for a half million dollar appropriation. Now, Oregon and all Oregonians, are vastly interested in the big show. All of us who can will be there, and all of us are more than willing to do our utmost to make it a memorable success. But, how about it? Half a million dollars for a six months' exhibit? Pretty strong isn't it? How many miles of good roads would that amount of money construct? Do the people of Central Oregon want their representative in the Legislature to support such an appropriation? We hazard the guess that the people hereabouts do not, most emphatically. Half of half a million dollars would be enough and to spare. Let missionary work begin at home, and a little more sane economy enter into this species of state publicity work. For instance, more attention to agricultural instruction on the ground—a work wherein Central Oregon leads—and less expenditure in competitive advertising, is an axiom that applies to state exposition exhibit enterprises just as we have been led to believe it applies to district development organization work.
