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HORSE THIEVING CASE A MISTRIAL

JURY IS UNABLE TO AGREE IN 26 HOURS

Robertsons Accused of Shipping Stolen Horses From Bend—"Pinto" Myers Gets Hot Shots From Attorney Wilson.

The adjourned session of Circuit Court at Prineville ended last Thursday, Judge Bradshaw presiding. Only one criminal case came to trial, this being against the Robertson brothers, "Punk" and Bill, on a charge of horse stealing. The jury was out for 26 hours, and after reporting to the judge that an agreement could not be reached, was dismissed.

It was charged that among a carload of horses shipped from Bend last summer were two belonging to George Russell. The prosecution also undertook to show that nine out of the 26 horses were stolen.

The feature of the trial was the scathing denunciation of "Pinto" Myers, attorney for the Robertsons, by Attorney Wilson of The Dalles, who made a 40-minute speech.

Local Cases Settled.

In the case of H. J. Overturf against E. H. Summy and wife to foreclose mortgage judgment was taken. The amount asked for was \$2250, with interest and costs of the action. In the case of the Bend Company vs. G. C. and N. A. Cooper, operating as the Terrebonne Lumber Co., judgment was taken in the sum of \$719.20 with interest and disbursements of the suit. The First National Bank took judgment by default in its case against Earl B. Houston to foreclose a mortgage J. P. Rogers, one of the defendants, appeared and the matter as concerning him was referred by the court to Judge H. C. Ellis to take testimony. The Gault Company had a claim of some \$300 against the Bend Milling & Warehouse Co. for piping. The piping was shipped after the order for it had been countermanded, and the suit was brought to collect. Settlement was effected by the Gault Company taking the piping back and the costs being arranged by the parties in litigation.

Vernon A. Forbes appeared as attorney for the plaintiff in the cases brought by Overturf, the bank and The Bend Company, and for the milling and warehouse company. C. S. Benson represented the Gault Company. Mrs. Nellie Wright was granted a divorce from Harry Joseph Wright who failed to appear and answer the complaint.

WOMEN NOT ELIGIBLE TO SERVE ON JURIES

Attorney General Rules That Suffrage Amendment Only Makes Them Qualified as Electors.

SALEM, Dec. 11—Women of Oregon cannot serve as jurors. The recent enfranchisement of women did not invest them with the legal qualifications required of jurors.

This is the unexpected opinion of Attorney General A. M. Crawford, given to J. D. Venator, deputy district attorney at Lakeview. Attorney Venator asked the attorney general whether or not women under the new law are qualified to serve upon juries, provided they have all the other qualifications as required by law, and Attorney General Crawford says:

"Replying thereto I would cite you to section 990 of Lord's Oregon laws, which provides as follows:

"A person is not competent to act as a juror unless he be a male inhabitant of the county in which he is returned, and who has been an inhabitant thereof for the year next preceding the time he is drawn or called."

"The amendment to the constitution did not change the status of women as far as citizenship is concerned. They were already citizens. It only made them qualified electors and did not in any way change their condition so far as jury service is concerned.

"It is the opinion of this office that until further legislation women would not be entitled, under the section above quoted, to serve on juries in this state."

Several loads of steers brought \$7.25 per hundred. Choice cows and heifers have found ready sale at strong prices, but the ordinary grade of the stuff went at barely steady prices. Heavy receipts of hogs in the yards for the week. Good demand for choice hogs weighing around 200 lbs., and prices about the same as last week or \$7.75 for tops. Receipts of sheep and lambs not extra heavy but enough to meet killers needs. Best lambs bringing \$5.25 per hundred. Best ewes \$4.00 and best wethers \$5.00 Receipts for the week were cattle 996, calves 9, hogs 3520, sheep 5030, horses 44.
