WOMAN TAKEN OFF SUDDENLY

MRS. KLEIN DIES OF HEART FAILURE

End Comes on Twenty-Fourth Anniversary of Wedding—Funeral Held Sunday Afternoon and Interment in Cemetery Here.

On the twenty-fourth anniversary of her marriage, Mrs. J. J. Klein died suddenly Thursday evening, December 19, at 10 o'clock, at her home here. Anemia and heart trouble were the cause of death.

In apparently good health, Mrs. Klein was talking with her children when she was seized with a heart attack similar to that which she suffered some weeks ago while she was attending services at the Methodist church. In less than fifteen minutes, she was dead, despite all efforts to prolong life. The end came almost at the same hour when she, as Miss Martha Stover, was married to Mr. Klein in Lenark, Ill., on December 19, 1888.

Telegrams were sent to her son Louis, who belongs to the marine band at San Francisco, and to a sister residing in Seattle, but neither was able to reach here for the funeral. It was conducted Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock from the residence by Rev. E. C. Newham of the Methodist church, assisted by the new Baptist minister, Rev. E. R. Judd. There was a large attendance of friends of the family. Music was furnished by a special choir. The pallbearers were E. M. Thompson, Dr. F. H. Thompson, N. P. Smith, R. M. Smith, H. J. Eggleston and G. H. Forst. Interment was made in Pilot Butte Cemetery, the burial being in charge of Undertaker C. P. Niswonger.

Mrs. Klein was 44 years old on October 5, and had been a member of the Christian church for some years. She is survived by her husband; one son, Louis; three daughters, Miss Grace, Elizabeth and Mildred; three sisters, one residing in Seattle and the others in Lenark, Ill. The Klein family came to Bend in June from Salem. Mr. Klein building the Altamont Hotel and the apartment house on the lot adjoining it on the south.
