# MERCURY LURKS CLOSE TO ZERO

## EXCEPTIONALLY COLD WEATHER

"Busted" Pipes Make Everyone Sad Eyed Except the Plumbers—Low Temperatures Recorded in Central Oregon Towns.

Frosty in morning, plumbers take warning. Below zero at night, plumber's delight. That adaptation of the sailor's rhyme seems appropriate just now when everyone but the plumbers is sad eyed, thanks to "busted" water pipes.

Jack Frost has been playing pranks with Bend this week. The lowest temperature of the winter was recorded Saturday night when the government thermometer dropped to zero. Sunday night it went to 2 degrees above and Monday night to 5 above. There were a number of local thermometers which gave lower temperatures than this official record. The coldest last winter at Bend was 9 degrees below zero on the night of January 8, with zero on the night before.

The cold snap did not cause much damage locally except that nearly everybody had frozen pipes, keeping the plumbers on the jump. Saturday night about 10 o'clock the wheel at the power house became choked with ice and it was necessary to shut down for a hour or so. The river above the dam has been frozen over, and there has been much skating, despite the fact that the snowfall interfered with the best spots. Up the river a few miles where the Wenandy Livery Co. has a pond the ice is 16 inches thick, and the annual harvest and storing of a supply for summer is on this week.

Bend has not suffered from the cold as much as some of the other Central Oregon towns. At Sisters Saturday night 1 degree below zero was registered; at La Pine 6 below, while at Crescent Sunday night the mercury dropped to 27 below, according to a report received by the forest service. Yesterday cloudy weather set in, with snow, and the temperature rose rapidly. Last night 5 1/2 inches of snow fell. The following is the weather report as kept by the local co-operative government observer for the past week:

## O-W. R. & N. TAKES OVER LINE

Management of Oregon Eastern Railroad Reported Shifted.

(Vale Enterprise.) Private advices received here from Portland indicate the transfer, January 1, of the Oregon Eastern railroad from the management and control of the Oregon Short Line, at Salt Lake, Utah, to the ownership, management and control of the O-W. R. & N. Co., at Portland. The deal involves all matters pertaining to the Oregon Eastern system, westward from Vale, but construction work will continue to be pushed on the line during the present winter. Officials of the Oregon Short Line in Vale, when asked about the reported transfer, were unable to confirm the transaction, or to give any information whatever concerning it. News obtained from other sources, however, makes it certain that the big transfer became effective January 1. Just what plans the O-W. R. & N. will ultimately inaugurate for the operation of the Oregon Eastern remains to be seen, but the terminus will be at or near Vale.
