In the birth rate there were two more males than females—64 boys, 62 girls. The dates of the remaining dances have been announced as follows: February 1, February 15, March 8 and March 29. For length of "running gear" the chickens of Mrs. J. R. Couch of Laidlaw evidently take the blue ribbon. A story comes to hand that during a recent rainstorm Mrs. Couch had some of the chickens in a coop. The water, it is said, rose three feet in the pen but the chickens were not drowned. According to advices received by local deputy game wardens from State Game Warden Finley, hunters and fishermen who simply have the receipt of a notary for their application for a license are not legally protected. It will be necessary to secure the actual license to be within the law. The removal of the postoffice to the O'Donnell building will be about February 1, the delay being due primarily to the non-arrival of the new fixtures. The Portland concern that has the contract for these has written Postmaster Minor stating that they will be delivered before the end of this month.
