

CITY GRINDS OUT ROUTINE

TREASURER'S SALARY BOOSTED

Phone Franchise Held up For Consideration—Bills Are Ordered Paid From the Sewer and General Funds, at Monthly Session.

Little besides routine work was taken up by the City Council at its monthly meeting last night.

The \$3000 bond of Construction Engineer Koon was approved and a sum equal to that amount was ordered turned over to his account for February construction expenses, under the provisions of the working plan previously outlined.

The city treasurer was granted a salary of \$25 a month for the rest of the year.

A petition for the vacation of certain blocks in Westoria and Center addition, for re-platting, was granted by the council.

Sidewalks were ordered for lots 1 and 9 in block 19, the city to construct necessary alley cross walks.

The franchise for telephone sought by Kempster B. Miller, read for the second time, was placed on the table until the next meeting, for final action. Members of the council urged that some time limit for construction should be included in the franchise.

A petition requesting the appointment of a night policeman was read. At the time, the council took no action on the matter. The mayor was absent, but stated later that if the council desires such an appointment, it will be made.

Gestation Period of Ewes.
The gestation period of the ewe, or the time she carries her lamb, is between 145 and 150 days on the average. Ewes bred the middle of October are due to lamb the middle of March—a good time for lambs to come if good shelter is available. If shelter is poor, however, it is better for the lambs to come the last of March. A tried ram is of great value in insuring the time for the lambs to arrive. It is a great disappointment to have lambs coming for a period of six weeks.

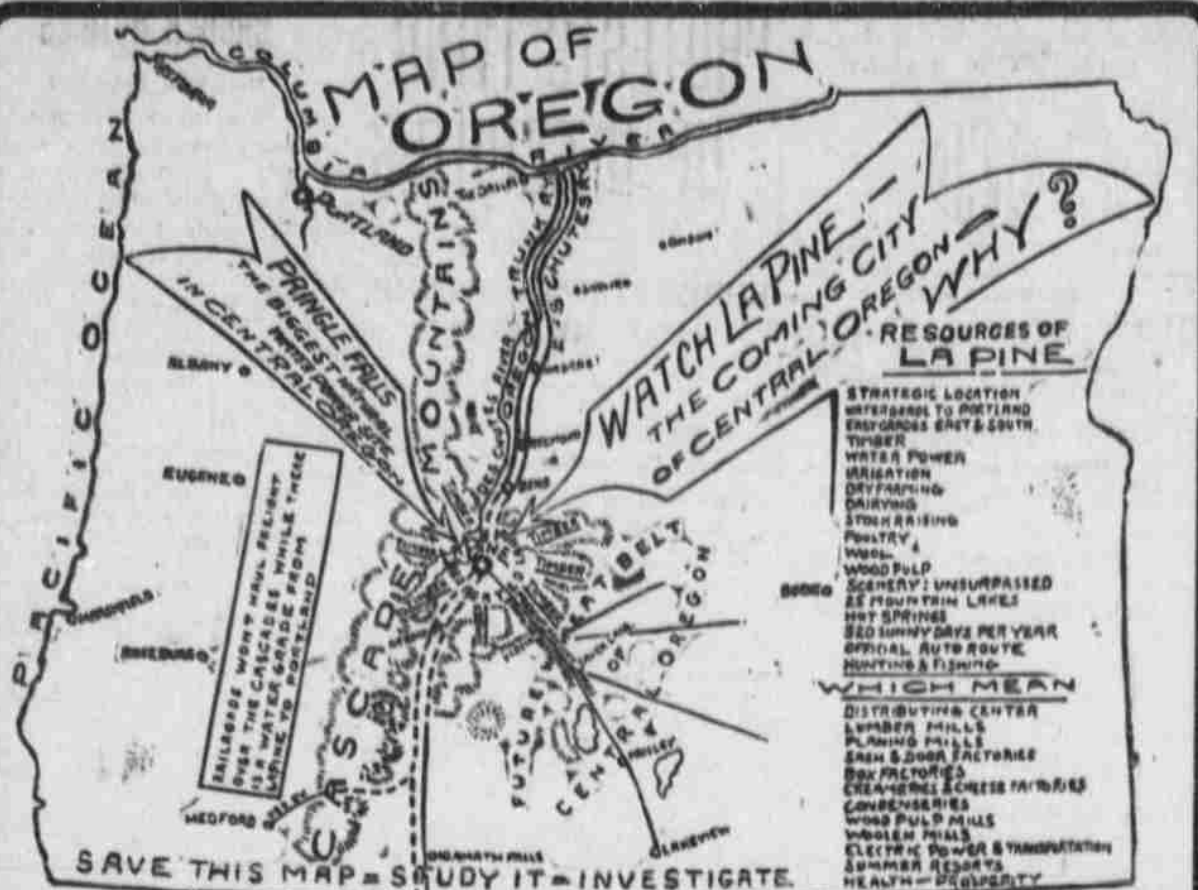
