40 MEN ARE ON SEWER JOB

FINE WEATHER HELPS PROGRESS

When Ohio Street Work is Completed, Boiler and Battery of Drills Will Tackle Northeast Work, Across Pilot Butte Canal.

With six steam drills working and 40 men on the job, considerable progress has been made with the sewer project during the week. One gang with three drills, fed by one boiler, is working on Ohio street and the other, with three drills, in the alley west of Wall street, in the rear of the Coe residence and northward.

Thanks to the recent good weather far quicker work has been accom-

plished than has been the case up to the present, when the men have been laboring under very adverse weather conditions which interfered seriously. By tomorrow arrangements will be completed for the installation of a compressed air drilling outfit which will handle a minimum of 500 feet of hole daily. This work will be done on the contract, at so much a foot.

As soon as the trench now open on Ohio street is completed and filled in the boiler and drills working there probably will be moved northeast of town and the trench put in where it crosses the irrigation canal as it will be a great convenience and economy to get this portion done while the water is out of the canal. The stretch of work from town to the disposal plant can be put through far easier and cheaper than that up town, as there will be little necessity for covering the shots and taking other precautions.
