

NEW NICKELS REACH BEND

Five-cent Piece Coined This Year Does Not Meet With Popular Favor

The new nickel has arrived in Bend. Among the first to reach the town was one out of the first twelve coined. It came from Mrs. William Zelders of Denver, where some are being coined, being sent to her father, L. A. McKenzie. He passed it to The Bulletin for a copy of the paper to be sent to his son, C. M. McKenzie, at Long Beach, Cal.

Two of these new nickels were brought from Chicago by Clarence Mannheim. The latest five-cent piece is not meeting with much popular favor, nearly everybody saying it is an artistic coin. On one side is pictured a buffalo, with the words "United States of America," "E Pluribus Unum" and "Five Cents." On the reverse side is shown the head of an Indian, with the word "Liberty" and the year, which is 1913. The nickel is thickest at the edge. The slot-machine people object to it because it will not go into the ordinary five-cent slot.

BASKET WILLOW CUTTINGS

Forest Service Will Supply Them to All Who Apply.

The United States Forest Service will have cuttings for distribution this spring of several species of basket willows which have been grown in the government forest nursery near Carson, Wash. These cuttings will be distributed to farmers and others who wish to make trials of basket willow on lands too wet for other crops. From 50 to 100 cuttings will be given to each person, for which no charge is made, but the recipients will be expected to report from time to time on the condition of the willows in order that the government may determine what varieties are best adapted to this region. Cuttings will not be furnished for ornamental or wind-break planting, but to those who wish to make a trial at growing willow rods for basket making. Any person desiring cuttings of basket willows under these conditions should make application to the District Forester, Forest Service, Portland, Oregon, before April first, about which time the distribution will be made.

SHANIKO EDITOR DIES.

Ed H. Overman, editor of the Shaniko Star and Maupin Monitor, was found last Wednesday morning lying on the floor of his room at the Hotel Dalles at The Dalles. He had made an auto trip to that city the day before with a friend. Death was due to heart trouble. He is survived by a wife and three children.

HELD UNDER HEAVY BONDS.

(Prineville Journal.) At the preliminary hearing of George Messenger on charge of larceny of a steer, the testimony against the defendant was grave enough to warrant Judge Kennedy in holding him to the grand jury in \$3500 bonds. Alonzo Weaver, an accomplice, became sick of his part in the affair and agreed to turn state's evidence after the two young men were committed from Bend for housebreaking. He led Sheriff Elkins to the spot on the desert where lay the dead steer bearing the brand of George Miller, and the latter, after seeing the brand and earmarks, promptly swore out an information.

Both Messenger and Weaver were already under \$2000 bonds on the burglary charge, and had secured bondsmen. The court also placed Weaver under a \$750 bond to appear as a witness. His father, David Weaver, is his surety. Messenger has not yet been able to secure bondsmen for the additional \$3500. Willard H. Wirtz conducted the prosecution, while W. P. Myers appeared for the defendant.

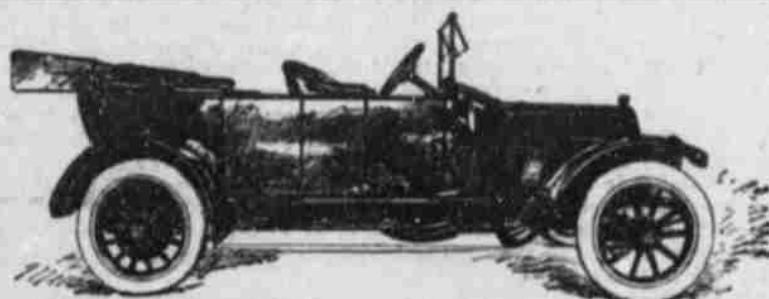
The following experiments were performed by the physics class last month:
