FRUIT, NOT GRAIN, IS TOPIC

"Agricultural Conference" at Port-Innt Ignored Central Oregon, Says D. E. Hunter-Speakers Want Agricultural Bill to Benefit.

"Portland is busy laying plans for the agricultural development of the state," said D. E. Hunter, who re turned from that city Sunday night, in speaking of the "agricultural conference" at the Commercial Club, which he attended. The interest the metropolis is taking in state-wide stomach development was commended by him but Mr. Hunter expressed surprise that cheap lands and grain-raising received practically no attention.

"There was about five hours of talk," continued Mr. Hunter, "and most of it mighty good, too. Only they confined themselves to fruit, string beans, prunes and the other products that grow in the Willamette volley. With the exeception of T. II. Wilcox, who urged that more attention be paid to wheat and less to those things which, he declared, already overdone, one would never have guessed that Oregon extended east of the Cascade mountain."

The purpose of the meeting was to devise ways and means of taking advantage of the recently enacted agricultural extension which provides that the benefits of the agricultural college may be takon to the farms, instead of the farmers being obliged to go to the college. Mr. Hunter characterized the remarks of C. L. Smith, agricultural expert of the O.-W. R. N. Co., as the most valuable of the session, Sawhill Sends Telegram.
