

CASE LONG IN COURTS ENDED

JUDGE DECIDES FOR DEFENDANTS

Action Was Brought by Lumber Company to Recover on Material For Building on Bond Street Occupied by the Club Cafe Now.

Judge W. L. Bradshaw of the Circuit Court has announced his decision in an equity case from Bend that has been in the courts since May, 1911. It is the action brought by the Bend Lumber Company, composed of A. H. Horn, W. F. McNaught and W. E. Scott, against J. B. Montague, P. C. Campbell, Mike Zupan, D. E. Hunter Realty Company, Mike McGrath, A. C. Seeley and Daisy Seeley. The judge rendered his decision in favor of the defendants.

The case was brought to collect \$540.65 on lumber which was furnished by the plaintiffs for the construction of the building now occupied by the Club Cafe, on Bond street. The contractor was Montague, who suddenly left town owing the lumber company. The other defendants were brought into the case by reason of the fact that in one way or another they were interested in the property on which stands the building.

A mechanic's lien was filed on the building by the lumber company, and the case went later to the Circuit Court for hearing. It was referred to J. M. Lawrence as referee and testimony was taken here last summer.

Judge Bradshaw announced his decision in a letter to V. A. Forbes, the attorney for the defendants. The plaintiffs were represented upon the trial of the case by C. S. Benson, although lien statement on which the suit was brought was prepared by Mr. Forbes.

In addition to failing to obtain the amount asked, the plaintiffs are taxed with the costs, amounting to more than \$100.

WIMERS MOVE TO ASHLAND

Aged Settler and His Wife Hope the Change Will Benefit Health.

George W. Wimer and wife of Tumalo have departed for their new home at Ashland, having left Bend last Thursday morning. Mrs. Wimer has been for some weeks in a critical condition with rheumatism, and has also been suffering from a broken wrist which she sustained some time ago from a fall. She hopes that the change of climate at this time will prove beneficial to her as well as to Mr. Wimer, who also is not in the best of health.

They expect to return during the summer for a short time at least. Mr. Wimer is very enthusiastic over the prospects of the Bend country and says were he a young man again he would not think of leaving but that on account of old age he is going to a lower altitude to see if it will improve his health.

FIND "INFERNAL MACHINE?"

Horseshoe Pitchers Get Hold of Pipe Containing Bullets.

Rev. E. C. Newham and Dr. Jackson took a stroll down by the river near the Boy Scouts lodge the other day and decided to indulge in the pastime of pitching horseshoes. Mr. Newham picked up a stake to drive into the ground and was using a piece of piping found handy, for a hammer. After a few blows, he noticed some wadding come out of the pipe. This was followed by bullets. He did not proceed further, but believing that he had hold of an infernal machine or the like, threw it into the river to avoid any possible danger of explosion. The sportmen are wondering who this "loaded" pipe was intended for, but are very thankful that it did not "get" them.

WEEKLY MARKET REPORT.

NORTH PORTLAND, March 21.—Receipts for the week have been: Cattle 1466, calves 50, hogs 4415, sheep 3562, horses 46. Beef liquidation has been liberal this week. Just a trifle too heavy for trade need. Steer offerings were mostly half fat stuff which buyers took over at \$7.25 to \$7.50. Top loads realized \$7.70 and cows and heifers sold well in small lots, but the market is anything but strong. A good bull trade ruled, while choice veal calves sold at \$9 to \$9.50. Cattle market showed a weak tendency and is off a nickel. Despite a five thousand run of hogs, the market supported a \$9.15 price range all week, and an active session resulted. Trading was not confined to light swine as smooth and rough heavy varieties cut considerable figure. Considering the enormous receipts, it is remarkable that prices did not slump badly, but their steadiness indicates the absorbing ability of Coast pork buyers. The sheep house had a holiday this week, for with the exception of Monday no business has been transacted. All

of Monday's sales were good, especially fed Easter mutton and lambs (wool on) sold higher than they will again. One lot of wethers went at \$6.75, ewes \$5.75, lambs \$7.40, and this shows the class of stuff on hand. No spring lambs came forward. Generally the mutton market is steady. Public consumption of beef, pork and mutton will return to normal after Easter and a true line on livestock market can then be obtained. Killers have received large shipments on contracted cattle and sheep which will tide them over the post-lenten period when demand will be urgent, and it appears from this distance that all markets will be more or less steady.
