

"SEND OFF" FOR BAILEY PARTY

PAISLEY PEOPLE ARE WELCOMED

Bend Company is Host at Dinner Given to Show That Bend Wants Development of All Central Oregon to be Accomplished.

Bend gave the "glad hand" Friday night to a party of land seekers bound for Paisley under the guidance of George M. Bailey, president of the Northwest Townsite Company. The Bend Company was the host of the little dinner that was served the immigrants at the Pilot Butte Inn dining room, attended by the dozen Swedes in the Paisley party and about a dozen Bend business and real estate men.

It was something new for one town to give such a send-off to a party of investors bound for another community, and the stand Bend took in the matter and the hearty welcome extended him and his people was vastly appreciated by Mr. Bailey as well as by the farmers who soon are to become Central Oregonians.

"We simply wanted to show Mr. Bailey and his people that Bend realizes fully what is good for one section is good for all parts of Central Oregon," said D. E. Hunter of The Bend Company, chief sponsor of the evening. "Little get-together meetings of this kind are the best sort of thing for the town and all our neighboring communities. It's also good for us real estate men to go on record as we did, showing our friendly feeling for other districts. What we want is to have newcomers feel that Bend is glad to welcome them, regardless of whether or not they stay here or invest here. Then they will like Bend, and will say a good word for it."

With J. E. Sawhill presiding, several informal talks were given and much singing perpetrated, to the evident enjoyment of the guests. Mr. Bailey made a most excellent speech, in which he showed his great appreciation of the welcome extended him. Addison Bennett of The Oregonian told of the splendid opportunities of the Paisley territory, and assured the homeseekers that they had made a good choice, while

other speakers had much to say regarding the good work the Northwest Townsite Company has done for Oregon.

The Swedes in the party are the advance guard of many more who are taking up lands near Paisley under the segregation of the Paisley Irrigation Company.

WINTRY WEATHER AGAIN.

There was a fall of two inches of snow, Portland and the Northwest also had snow, much more than was experienced here at a number of places. 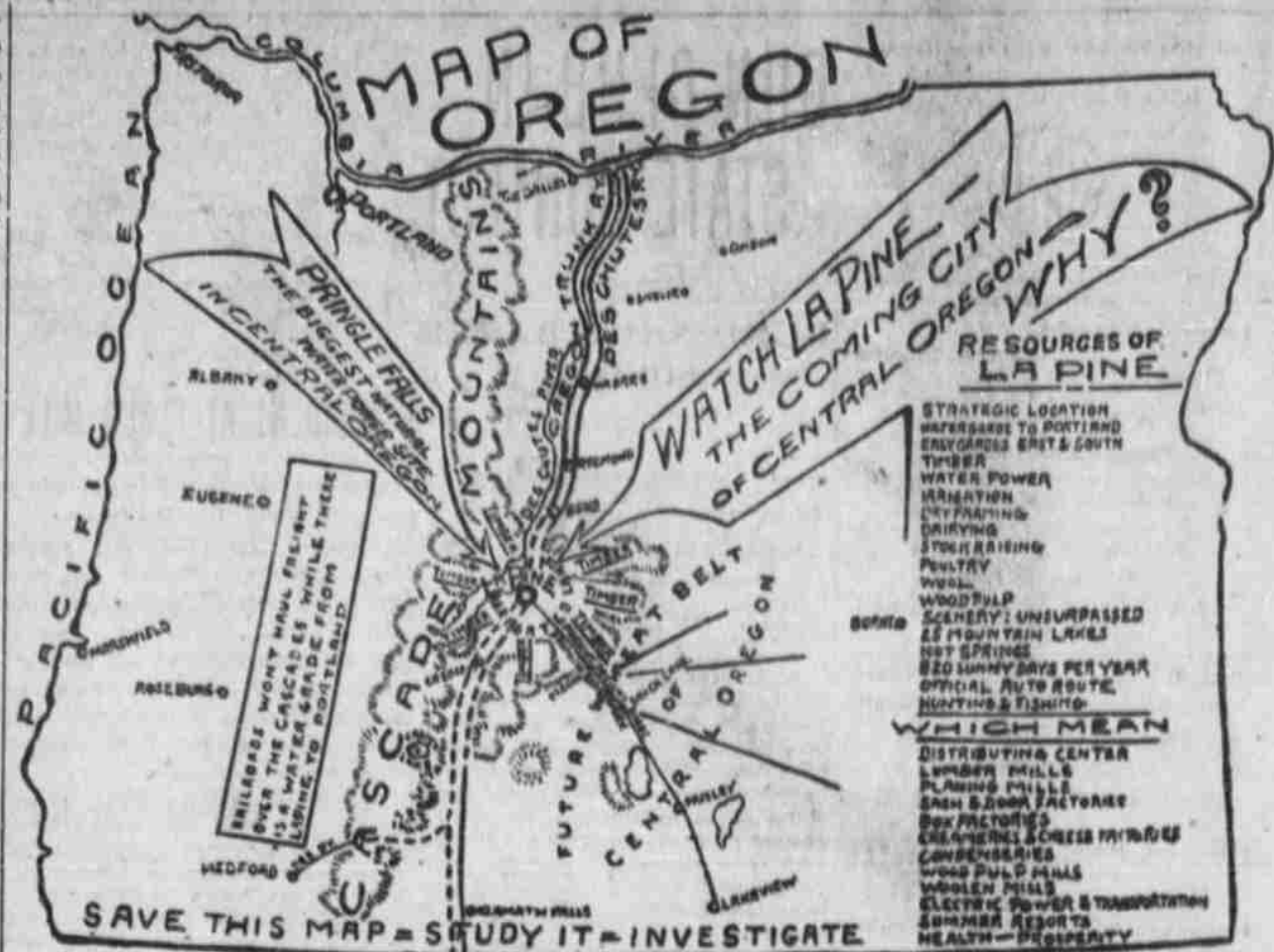
