MEETING DISCUSSES SCHOOL BOND ISSUE MATTERS

Pros and Cons of Important Local Development Threshed Out at Public Gathering-No Action Just Now.

A meeting held last night under the auspices of the Commercial Club discussed the proposed bond issue for the erection of a high school build-About 50 men attended, and much was said upon school matters. The most tangible result of the evening was a straw vote, held at the close of the meeting, in which 21 expressed themselves for a \$45,000 bond issue, 12 for a \$20,000 issue and 4 opposed any Issue and a numer did not vote.

It appeared that the school board and voted to place a \$45,000 issue efore the people.

The purpose of the meeting was to get expressions of popular opinion upon the matter. Several prominent citizens spoke strongly against such a large issue, maintaining that a building to cost about \$15,000 would answer all immediate needs. Some srought up the matter of erecting a grade instead of a high school building. H. J. Overturf and Clyde Mc-Kay, of the board, told of the difficulties of getting action, and supported the advisability of the procosed issue. F. M. Ray of the board had nothing to say. It was developed that the board had contracted to sell the bonds-whatever are issuedto a Denver firm at 103, a premium that they consider very satisfactory. No notices of an election on the matter have been posted as yet, and it was said by Mr. McKay this morning that he would oppose any action until the matter of a site had been settled, for the bonds would draw interest from the date of issue, while utilization of the funds might be delayed some time.
