

BUILD ON WEST SIDE OF RIVER

KENWOOD IS SCENE OF ACTIVITY

Number of New Homes Being Erected in This Addition—Several Good Residences Already There—Joe Innes Has Fine Home.

Building operations are being carried on extensively in Kenwood, west of the river, this spring, there being more activity in this part of town now than anywhere else. Last spring this honor went to Center addition.

Already there are several splendid homes in Kenwood. By far the best one, and a residence that compares very favorably with those on the east side of the river, is that of Joe Innes. Mr. Innes bought this property just after the house was started by Edd Newman last summer, and he has had built a handsome home. It is of the California bungalow style, with five rooms downstairs and several upstairs. The inside is in fir stained in golden oak. The fireplace in the living room is a feature of the house, as is also the Dutch kitchen. The house cost Mr. Innes nearly \$2000.

Mr. Innes last week bought the adjoining property from E. G. Harrison and now has four lots. Mrs. Innes has taken to the pastime of raising chickens, her first experience in this line. Her stock is White Orpingtons brought from the Willamette valley, and she now has several broods of chicks just hatched.

Walter Tolles, the painter, also has a splendid home in Kenwood. It was one of the first houses to be built in that part of town.

Another neat and comfortable house is that belonging to John Johnson. It is of three rooms, being plastered and having stone foundation.

The largest house now being erected in Kenwood is that of Julius Janett. It will have eight rooms and will be modern. He is having it plastered. The style is bungalow. He will have a good basement, with room for the installation of a heating furnace later on. Mr. Janett has a homestead in the Pringle Flats country.

On adjoining lots Al Howell and C. C. Brainard are having two four-room cottages built. These will be modern and neat houses.

Hert Caldwell has about completed a comfortable three-room house into which he has already moved.

David Winter, who recently came in from Portland, has started work on a four-room cottage.

J. B. Miner has plans ready for a residence which he will soon build in Kenwood. He is already living in a temporary cabin on the rear of his lot. L. B. Misener has lots nearby and expects also to build. Others who will have homes in Kenwood later are J. Edward Larson and Floyd Dement. Jay Saltzman expects to begin the erection of a garage in a short time and will later build a residence to cost about \$1000, according to Frank Sutherland, who has the contract for the garage. It will be 14 by 40 feet.

There are electric lights, water and some board sidewalks in Kenwood already, and it promises to become a popular residential section.

BEND PIONEER KILLED

Floyd L. Lohdell, Once Town Marshal, Fatally Hurt in Mine.

An account of the death, by accident, of a pioneer of the Bend country has been received by The Bulletin from F. Milo Lohdell, a brother of the unfortunate man. Floyd L. Lohdell, who was well known in this vicinity, being town marshal in 1906 and 1907, lost his life in a mine at Lafayette, Colo., on February 27, 1913. He was working in a mine with a lantern. He lighted a match and touched it to the wick. A piece of the burning wick dropped in a barrel of powder nearby, the presence of which was unknown to him. An explosion followed and he was frightfully injured about the body. After the explosion, he walked a mile and turned in a signal that there had been an accident; then he walked another mile to his residence where medical attention was summoned. He died later as a result of the injuries. He was 32 years old. He is survived by mother, three brothers and one sister. F. Milo Lohdell is teacher in the Hoopa Valley Indian School, at Hoopa, Cal.

WEEKLY MARKET REPORT.

NORTH PORTLAND, March 28—Receipts for the week have been: Cattle 1312, calves 38, hogs 2103, sheep 2783, horses 23. Cattle market steady to shade firmer. An excellent demand prevailed for prime beef. Top sales this week were made at \$8 to \$8.25, while bulk of steer offerings graded good to choice and realized \$7.60 to \$7.80. Butcher stock is equally strong, notably heifers and cows. There has been a

showing in the stuff supplies but packers gave higher bids for the fancy head on hand. A small lot of Prineville spayed heifers selling at \$7.75 featured. Best cows at \$7.25; bulls \$6.00, stags \$6.75 and calves at \$5.00 represents price range. The hog market has been a sensation all week. Clearing 10c to 20c. It finally settled at \$9.55 Wednesday. This price range breaks all records since 1910. Bulk of sales have averaged \$9.20 to \$9.40. Outlet considerably broader than supplies as demand has been increased while bulk of country swine has been marketed. Also Missouri River points continue high and all Coast packers are buying in Portland. Undertow here is strong and unless the present trade conditions experience a complete change may remain so indefinitely. A steady to firm mutton and lamb market featured principally by the smallest runs of the year. Wool yearlings sold up to \$6.75 and ewes \$5.75, sheared stuff brought \$1.00 less. Demand for choice and fat muttons is steady and unsatisfied. Lamb trade reached the \$8.00 level as expected, several loads of prime wool stuff brought this price.

IMPROVING HIS RANCH.
