

LION'S SHARE OF CASH FOR CROOK

BENNETT SHOWS HOW MONEY WENT

Expenditures Legislated For This County Are on Basis of \$80 per Capita—State Average is Only \$8, Says Oregonian Writer.

Writing in the Portland Oregonian on the proposed utilization of water from the Deschutes river for an irrigation project in northern Crook county, Addison Bennett has this to say, in passing, in reference to this county's share of the legislative appropriations:

"And it may be said that the taxpayers have been pretty severely hit by Central Oregon appropriations, really by Crook county appropriations, for in addition to the \$50,000 mentioned there was the further appropriation of \$450,000 for the completion of the Columbia Southern project, making an even half million dollars to be expended in this county, every cent of it in this immediate section of the county, during the ensuing two years.

"Surely when one remembers that in the state there are 2600 townships and that the total appropriations of the Legislature were something like \$6,000,000 and 20 townships got one-twelfth, or over 8 per cent of the total—looking at the matter in that light it can be seen that the people of these twenty townships, say a total number of 6000, received a trifle more than full recognition from the appropriations, getting at the rate of over \$80 "per," while the people of the state as a whole received less than \$8 "per."

"Those figures are not given in derision or fault-finding spirit. The embarking of the ship of state upon the strange sea of irrigation may be the best thing ever done by a Legislature in the United States. The friends of the measures mentioned say it is the entering wedge by which all of the arid lands of the West for which water can be found available will be made "to blossom as the rose." Let us not only hope but fervently pray that such may be the result."

roomed for days before rescuers were able to reach them.

In 25 Ohio cities and towns a conservative estimate places the number of deaths at 475; four in Indiana give 50.

The property loss is many millions and covers thousands of homes destroyed, miles of streets torn up, sewers and water systems rendered useless and, as a sort of jest, business blocks burned, not to the ground by the water's edge.

All but two of the railroads running into Chicago from the south and east were obliged to cancel all schedules. It will take months of time and millions of dollars to repair the losses that they alone have undergone.

As soon as news of the disaster reached the outside world, from all quarters assistance of every sort was rushed to the sufferers. Relief funds were started and supplies of clothing and food gathered for shipment. Oregon has sent a dozen or more cars of potatoes, a carload of salmon, one of flour and others with mixed contents, the railroads carrying all of them without charge.
