ORDINANCE NO. 75.

An ordinance providing for the lion the business of conducting bil-liard, bagatelle or pool rooms within he corporate limits of the city of Bend.

Be it ordained by the Common Council of the City of Bend;

Section 1. Any person, firm or cor-oration conducting a billiard, bagatelle or pool room within the cor-porate limits of the city of Bend shall pay into the city treasury for such privilege a license fee of \$100 per year payable quarterly in ad-

Provided, the provisions of this ordinance shall not apply to owners of pool or billiard tables kept only use in private homes or private clubs.

2. From and after the date that this ordinance shall be in full force and effect there shall sensed by the Common Council of the city of Bend not to exceed one silliard, bagatelle each one thousand inhabitants of the

ration who shall conduct any billiard, agatelle or pool room without first obtaining a license as herein pro-rided shall be punished by a fine not exceeding fifty dollars.
