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LA PINE WORK TO BE RESUMED

RESERVOIR SITE IS OBTAINED

Water Commissioner Cochran Accused of Using Railway Pass—Game Warden Finley Wants Desirable Birds Protected.

(Special to The Bend Bulletin.)
SALEM, April 14.—Work on the Deschutes Land Company's Carey act project, covering 31,000 acres near La Pine, will be resumed at once, according to J. E. Morson, president of the company, who was here last week on his return from consulting with government officials at Washington, D. C. The work was suspended nearly a year ago through the failure of the company to get a right of way for a reservoir site at Crescent lake from the government.
This right of way was held up pending an investigation by the federal government of the affairs of the company, the investigation resulting from complaints made to the department of the interior by Governor West, it will be remembered.
The federal agent, E. F. Dixon, after completing his investigation, made a report to Secretary Lane of the department entirely exonerating the company from all charges and stating that the company's affairs had been handled economically and that the company was in good financial condition for proceeding with the project. Secretary Lane informed Mr. Morson that there would be no further delay on the part of the government in granting the desired right of way.

Cochran is Accused.
George T. Cochran, La Grande, state water commissioner for the second water district, holds an annual pass on the O.-W. R. & N., and Governor West has secured information that he has been using it. So a few days ago the Governor addressed a letter to W. W. Cotton, general attorney for the company, asking where the company secured its authority for issuing the pass and Cochran got his authority for accepting it. The state laws prohibit a railroad company from issuing a pass to any person except its officials and employees, including attorneys, and the state water code prohibits a water commissioner from engaging in any other business while holding office.

Wants Good Birds Protected.
A campaign of education for the protection of the desirable birds in the state is being prepared by State Game Warden W. L. Finley, who has arranged with John F. Havard, professor of biology at the state university, to give a lecture on "Common Oregon Birds, Their Habits and Their Value," in a number of schools of the state. These will be followed by other lectures. Mr. Finley also expects to make investigation of the character and amount of food eaten by various birds. This will be done by examining the contents of the birds' stomachs. The game warden tells of a China pheasant's stomach which contained 300 earthworms and 100 large fly larvae. The stomach of a bobwhite contained over 100 potato bugs, and Mr. Finley says it is not unusual for a young bird to eat its weight in insects in a day's time.

MISS EASTES ENGAGED.
When the Priscilla Club met with Miss Edith Eastes at the Coe residence Monday night, the members were treated to a genuine and pleasant surprise when announcement was made of the engagement of the hostess of the evening. Mrs. L. P. Coe read a "telegram" from San Francisco which announced the betrothal of Miss Eastes to George R. Stapleton of that city. Mr. Stapleton is the Western manager of the Buck boys & Range Co. The wedding date is fixed for October. The couple expect to make San Francisco their home.

NOTICE OF PASSAGE OF RESOLUTION FOR STREET IMPROVEMENT.
Whereas, the Common Council of the city of Bend at its regular adjourned meeting of March 10th, 1913, ordered the city engineer of said city of Bend to prepare plans and specifications for an appropriate improvement, together with estimates of work to be done and the probable cost thereof of the following described portions of the following described streets within the city of Bend, to-wit:
Nevada street from Bond to Wall St.; Greenwood Ave. from Bond to the intersection of 12th St.; Bond Street from the north line of Greenwood to a point 100 feet south of Minnesota St.; Oregon Street from the center of Block 13 to the alley in Block 2; Bond St. from Greenwood to the front of Lot 14 in Block 15; Wall St. from the front of Lot 1 of Block 2 of North Addition to the South line of Minnesota; Minnesota from Wall St. to the front of Lot 13 in Block 16 of Bend, and
Whereas, it appears from the records and files in the recorder's office that the city engineer of the city of Bend has prepared and filed with the city recorder plans and specifications for an appropriate improvement, together with his estimates for work to be done and the probable cost thereof, pursuant to the direction of the Common Council of the city of Bend heretofore made relative to the above described streets, and
Whereas, the Common Council of the City of Bend upon examination has found such plans, specifications and estimates to be in all respects satisfactory, and by resolution duly made and entered on its records did, on the 14th day of April, 1913, approve said plans, specifications and estimates and determine the boundaries of the district benefitted and to be assessed for said improvements.
Now, therefore, be it resolved by the Common Council of the city of Bend that said Common Council proceed to make said improvement aforesaid, improving all of said streets or parts thereof above described by grading the same according to the grades and sub-grades of said respective streets as now established, the probable cost of which will be \$4584.20, said amount being the city engineer's estimate of the probable cost thereof.
Be it further resolved, that the following boundaries be and they are hereby designated as the boundaries of the estimated district to be benefitted and assessed for said improvement, to-wit:
Beginning at the intersection of Ohio Street and the center of the alley in the replat of Block 4 in the original plat of Bend, running thence northerly along the said center line of said alley in Block 4, to the south line of Lots 6 and 7, Block 3, thence westerly along the south line of said Lots 6 and 7, Block 3, to the west boundary of the original plat of Bend; thence northerly along the west line of Blocks 3, 2 and 1 to the northwest corner of Lot 1, Block 1, Plat of Bend, and the southwest corner of Lot 11, Block 1 of North Addition to Bend, being one and the same point, thence southeasterly along the northerly line of said Lot 1, Block 1, Original Plat of Bend, a distance of 90 feet, being a point in the center line of the alley in Block 1 of said North Addition to Bend, thence northeasterly through the center of said alley to the north line of said North Addition to Bend, thence easterly along the northerly line of said North Addition to the center of the alley in Block 2 of said North Addition, thence southerly along the center of said alley to the northerly line of Evergreen Avenue; thence in a southwesterly direction

across Evergreen Avenue to the center of Third Street in said North Addition; thence southerly through the center of said Third Street to the center of its intersection with the center line of Fir Avenue, thence easterly on the center of said Fir Avenue to its intersection with the center line of 12th Street in the Original Plat of Bend, thence south along the center line of 12th Street to its intersection with the center line of the alleys in Blocks 22 and 25 of Bend, thence west along the center line of said alley to its intersection with the center line of 10th street, thence along the said center of 10th Street to its intersection with Lava Road; thence along the center line of said Lava Road to a point opposite the center of the alley in Block 16, thence northwesterly from said starting point to the center of the alley which runs southwesterly through said Block 16, thence southwesterly on the center line of said southwesterly alley to its intersection with the center line of Ohio Street, thence northwesterly along the center of Ohio Street to the point of beginning.
