Hog Meat.

Since last August not a hog has been imported into this state for pany of Portland. He says Oregon farmers are going extensively into the hog and other livestock business.

During 1911, more than half the total number of hogs received at the Portland market came from Nebraska. Last year, this number was deder to feed its own people.

Mr. Colt submitted figures showing that the livestock industry in Oregon is five times greater than fruit growing and greater than wheat, wool and dairy products combined.
