

CONVENTION OF BAPTIST CHURCH

DESCHUTES ASSOCIATION MEETS HERE

Second Gathering of Members Attends to Annual Business and Listens to Able Sermons—Dr. Agar From Portland Speaks.

The second annual meeting of the Deschutes Association of Baptist churches was held in this city Monday and yesterday. The association comprises the Baptist churches in the Deschutes valley and was formed last year with its first meeting at Redmond. At the present meeting, delegates were in attendance from Bend, Redmond, Ione, Powell Butte and Fossil, with visitors from Portland and Spokane. Dr. W. B. Hinson of the White Temple, Portland, was expected to be present as the principal speaker but at the last moment found himself unable to come because of a church conference in California which he was obliged to attend. In his place came Rev. Dr. F. A. Agar, his assistant at the White Temple.

The meeting opened Monday at 7:30 p. m., a prayer meeting being held until the arrival of Dr. Agar on the train, when he gave the address of the evening. Yesterday morning there was a devotional meeting led by Earle Benton of Redmond, after which several items of business were disposed of. The Bible school work was presented by Miss Elyen, and a number of short addresses were made by visiting delegates. Following this Rev. E. G. Judd, the pastor, preached the annual sermon.

On Tuesday afternoon the devotional service was led by Rev. R. N. Parent of Latah, Wash. At the business meeting which followed reports of committees were received and a presentation given of the work of the Woman's Society by Miss Elyen; of the publication society by Rev. D. Loree; of missions by Rev. H. H. Foskett, and of home and foreign societies by Dr. Agar. Rev. Mr. Judd was elected moderator for the coming year, Earle Benton was chosen as vice-moderator.

The session last night began with a street meeting conducted by Rev. Jena McAllister of Ione, after which Mr. Benton gave a report on young people's work.

The convention ended with Dr. Agar's sermon, a very able address thoroughly enjoyed by the large audience in attendance.

Rev. R. N. Parent of Latah, Wash., and Rev. F. A. Agar of Portland were among the visitors.
