The "magazine habit" is often condemned by those who bewail the modern American tendency to avoid "worth while" reading. There can be no doubt that the flood of periodicals, with their catchy effervescent, easily-swallowed and easily-digested stories, have come to occupy about all the attention which the average American cares to devote to reading. It is true enough that sound literature is suffering at the hands of this mental chewing gum with which we occupy our leisure minutes. But on the other hand it is undeniable that the habit of reading is vastly more general and more popular in America today, proportionately to population, than ever before; nor can it be doubted that the inexpensive and pleasant magazine articles are in a great measure responsible for this. It is safe to say that today more average men and women throughout the land know something about world events than ever before in a country of comparatively sparse population and great expanse. And the magazines are responsible for this—responsible, we think, even more than the newspapers, the latter inevitably being comparatively local in their interest. Such a periodical as the Saturday Evening Post, for instance, which reaches probably ten million readers, is a marvelous force in popularizing reading for pleasure and profit. It is safe to say that this magazine alone has done more to awaken general interest in "questions of the day" than could be accomplished by a hundred lecturers working for a hundred years. To it, and to others like it, in a great measure, is due the nation-wide attention to public affairs that is becoming a national characteristic.

Familiarity is said to breed contempt. It is true that when one lives long in a place the beauties of the surroundings become so customary as to lose much of their charm. This state of affairs holds true in Bend. The situation of the town is, without doubt, one of the most attractive that can be imagined; the river, places and mountains combine to make a scenic setting which is rarely equalled, and not surpassed, in the Northwest. But we are so accustomed to it that we all are apt to forget this important phase of our tangible "natural resources." It is when we happen upon some stranger, strolling about with a camera and going into rhapsodies over the scenery, that a full realization is brought home to us of the extraordinary charm of Bend's environment.

LOCATION MAPS FILED.

P. A. Worthington, representing the Harriman railroad, was in Burns a few days the past week and filed in the local land office maps of the last link through Harney county of the Oregon Eastern railroad. These maps cover a stretch of nearly 45 miles, reaching from the east line of section 25, township 26 south, range 30 east, running west by a little south and leaving the county at the west line of section 6, township 27 south, range 24 east.

Progress on this road will now be rapid. An opening has been made through the big tunnel in Malheur canyon and only short work will be necessary to permit track laying through it and the transportation of trains and materials for the laying of track on the grade which is already made to the east line of Harney county. In the meantime, grading through Crane creek canyon will proceed and by the close of summer the whistle will be heard in Harney valley.

Deadly Venom of the Cobra.

A full sized cobra is able to eject enough venom at a single full and complete bite to kill about twenty men. The Indian cobra yields as much as twenty drops and Dr. Hanna mentions having obtained as much as twenty-eight drops.

In experiments with the venom of the cobra F. W. Fitzsimons, an expert, found that one drop diluted in a little water and injected into the tissues of the leg of a large monkey killed it in half an hour's time. A fraction of a drop was sufficient to kill a rat and a fowl within an hour. Judging from the effects of cobra venom on the higher animals, Mr. Fitzsimons considers that one full drop is a fatal dose for a strong, healthy man.—Westminster Gazette.
