

# EVERYONE DOWN ON SPRINGER

## OFFICIALS UNITED IN OPPOSITION

**Affidavit, Signed by Sheriff and Commissioners, States That Judge Knew All About County Auto and Favored the Purchase.**

(Editorial Correspondence)

PRINEVILLE, May 10.—That the officers of Crook county are, for once, all united, and are unanimous in their opinions upon an important matter, is evident to anyone who makes even the most casual inquiry around the court house. The matter upon which they agree so beautifully is this: The Hon. G. Springer, judge of Crook county, is more of a liability than an asset to said county. Some simply refer to him as a nuisance; others employ language that a modest newspaper would blush to repeat.

Mr. Springer, it appears, has, to a great degree, endeavored to take upon himself the individual conduct of all the affairs of the county. It has been his open boast that the deplorably inefficient and wasteful methods employed in the several offices would be remodelled and reformed under his enlightened administration.

While the Utopian results modestly predicted by His Honor are not as yet apparent to an uninformed layman, one result of his action is quite apparent, to-wit: every officer is heartily "down on him" for his interference in affairs outside the normal province of his work, and in which, it is freely stated, he has neither the common sense nor the business experience to venture. Just what the results of this mutiny will be one cannot as yet predict.

### Said He Opposed Auto.

One matter that evidently has stuck in the crop of his fellow members of the county court is the statement of Judge Springer regarding the automobile recently purchased by the county for the sheriff's use. His Honor went on record as being opposed to the purchase of the machine.

The following is extracted from one of his several letters to The Bulletin—that dated March 19:

"The county auto I would not at present have ordered. The heavy bills of the sheriff for auto hire, allowed at the term just closed, were for services performed under the direction of the commissioners without my knowledge. As the district attorney considered them legal and as many of our substantial taxpayers are especially interested, I allowed the bills."

In reference to this letter, and general statements and implications of Mr. Springer that he was always opposed to the auto purchase, and that, in effect, it was "railroaded through" on him, the following sworn affidavit will be of interest. Signed by the auto agent, the sheriff and the two county commissioners, it shows conclusively that Judge Springer was thoroughly acquainted with the details of the auto purchase, and always favored it. The statement is being published here in justice to the other members of the court, upon whom some measure of odium seems to have been cast by the statements of its judge, which at least have im-

plied that he alone was laboring for economy, while his colleagues worked extravagances through despite his efforts.

### The Auto Affidavit.

The affidavit follows: State of Oregon, County of Crook, ss. J. C. Robinson, Frank Elkins, Willis W. Brown and R. H. Bayley, being first duly sworn and on oath, each for himself and not one for the other, depose and say that Frank Elkins is sheriff of the county and state aforesaid; that Willis W. Brown and R. H. Bayley are commissioners in and for said county and state; that learning that the County of Crook aforesaid was in the market for an automobile, the said J. C. Robinson approached the several members of the county commissioners' court about the regular January term of said court and at various times thereafter with reference thereto, including G. Springer, county judge, and Willis W. Brown and R. H. Bayley, county commissioners; that at all and each of said meetings the said G. Springer, in the presence of these affiants agreed with them that the purchase of automobile for said county would be a saving financially to said county; that the said G. Springer agreed to the purchase of an automobile and reserved final decision with the other members of said commissioners' court for the reason only that said members, not being familiar with the great number of makes and models of automobile and motor cars, were undecided as to the best and most practicable model to purchase for county use;

That at the regular March term of said commissioners' court the matter was again taken up and considered and that at all times in the presence of these affiants G. Springer agreed that the purchase of a motor car would be a financial saving for said county; but that all the members, including the said G. Springer, were still undecided as to the best model for the county's use, whereupon the said Willis W. Brown and R. H. Bayley decided to place the names of several eligible cars in a hat and make a selection by lot; that by such a method the Haynes model was selected by the said Willis W. Brown and R. H. Bayley, that said decision was immediately and promptly communicated to the said G. Springer and it was thereafter understood and agreed in open court that the Haynes model, selected in such a manner was to be purchased by the county of Crook and the proper orders and journal entries were to be made by the court and the clerk be instructed to issue warrant in payment for same; that the said G. Springer neglected to have the proper orders drawn and recorded, that he was therefore compelled and did call an adjourned session of the March term at which all members were present and at which time the orders and journal entries were made and the clerk of the court instructed to issue a warrant in payment of the said automobile and that G. Springer did not, nor did he ever, in court, dissent from the action of said court in making said purchase, or in the presence of these affiants.
