Francois Blanc, the Ex-Convict, Who Bought Monaco.

THEN STARTED MONTE CARLO.

A Bold and Reckless Boldier of Fortune, He Instituted the Gilded Gaming Palace That Now Wins Millions Yearly For Its Wealthy Owners.

Francola Blanc, an ex-convict from tomburg, bought the principality of Monaco, boots and baggage. The genas of gambling had claimed many an ndividual, many a noble and his estate and not infrequently an entire city. out it had never before undertaken such a conquest as this.

Francois Blanc Is one of the most remarkable of all soldiers of fortune. Of als early history little is known. He vas seized by the authorities of Homourg for having made fraudulent use of the telegraph in relation to stock achange news received from Paris. S. P. Lev, formerly assistant sales His method was one of the very oldest -namely, the corruption of the emdoyees. It seems that at this time the lerman law did not precisely cover his species of swindling, and he and als twin brother escaped with a senence of seven months.

Francois Bianc was not discouraged. He had accumulated 100,000 francs, and with that sum he established the Kursaal at Homburg. More than this, Francois Blane bought and paid for the principality of Monaco. He paid Charles III. 500,000 'rancs a year and all his expenses, with percentage of the profits; he kept up ill the roads and gardens for the prinipality; he paid the police and magis trates and all fixed charges of the lingdom. Moreover, when the merhe French senate to resist gambling at Monte Carlo and when the subjects of the principality threatened to revolt Charles issue an edict abolishing all oncession, in addition to what he had already paid. Binue paid all the taxes of Monaco.
