ESTIMATE WILL COVER ALL COST

ENGINEER R. E. KOON MAKES REPORT

Land Damage as Well as Construction Included—Work to Be Finished by Middle of July. Details of May Report. That the sewer work is progressing finely and will be finished within the estimate was the substance of the report made by Engineer Koon to the city council on Friday evening. Inasmuch as this statement covers not only the actual cost of construction but also land damages which may have to be paid it should be very gratifying news to the taxpayers of the city. At the time of making this statement Mr. Koon also presented the formal report of the construction work to June 1. This shows 4700 feet of sewer completed while pipe

has been laid as follows: 8 inch, 3070 feet; 10 inch, 375 feet; 12 inch, 2307 feet, and 16 inch, 1542. The earth excavation now totals 3671 feet and rock 5195. 18 manholes have been completed, one lampole and two flush tanks. During the month of May there were 72 men employed on an average and the average wage was 30 cents per hour. The total of expenditures to June 1 was \$46,975.37 of which \$42,443.62 represents completed work and \$4531.74 material on hand.
