### RICHARD G. WILCE DIES

Man Injured in Sewer Work in May Succumbed This Morning.

Richard G. Wilce, who was injured on the sewer construction work on May 24, died this morning at 11:40 o'clock as a result of collapse, which first was noted about 5 a. m. Sunday his left leg was amputated between the hip and knee, and in the accident he lost his right eye and sustained other serious injuries.

He is survived by a mother and an invalid sister at Cheney, Wash., who were notified immediately by City Physician Coe. What disposition will be made of the body depends upon their instructions. Since the end of May Wilce has been kept in the Mitchell house back of the Baptist church, attended by Ed Chamberlain as nurse. It was while firing shots in the sewer tunnel in Lytle that he was caught by the blasts which he had just set off. He was heroically rescued from a seemingly certain death by Nels Olander, who hauled him out of the tunnel while shots were going off. Wilce was foreman of this portion of the work.

### GOVERNOR WEST WILL WRITE

Successful Fruit Grower Also Contributes Valuable Article.  
Work on The Bulletin's Development Number, which will be issued July 20, is progressing rapidly, and with much of the material for the is-

ue in hand it has taken shape sufficiently far to make it certain of being far better than the 44-page special of last July.

Assurance was received from Governor Oswald West this morning that he will prepare an article dealing with the Columbia Southern enterprise, which will be, in effect, a message from the state's executive to the settlers of the segregation, telling them and others what "Oregon's first irrigation enterprise" really means. A most excellent article has also been received from Guy Lafol-

lette of the Lafollette Nursery Company, which has extensive fruit orchards at Powell Butte. This gives by far the best description of just what can be done in Crook county with fruit that ever has been published, and coming from an authority who has made a success himself, it is of special value. In addition to these there are more than a dozen other special articles of importance.

### EASTES JUSTICE OF PEACE

Promised Appointment Held up, Blocking Legal Procedure.

Ward H. Coble tendered his resignation last week as local justice of the peace to the County Court. It was accepted, and the assurance was

given by Judge Springer that the petition which was presented, asking the appointment of J. A. Eastes, would be granted immediately.

But yesterday when two urgent arrest cases came up for a justice to act upon, it was discovered that no appointment had been made and, apparently, that Judge Springer intended making none for some time. When telephoned to, he announced that he had "received several applications," wished to investigate, etc. Finally, after Deputy District Attorney Wirtz at Prineville had exhausted himself trying to get action, without which no legal steps could be taken, Commissioners Bayley and Brown were called upon for aid, the upshot of the ensuing telephone confabs being that the appointment of Mr. Eastes was finally made as justice of the peace for Bend precinct.
