RECORD RUN FROM PELICAN

S. O. Johnson Says Roads to South Are in Excellent Shape.
S. O. Johnson, heavy timber owner in the Deschutes valley was here on Saturday. He came in his car from Klamath Falls and stopped with his agent here, John E. Ryan, at The Tulles.
"We made the run from Pelican Lodge in record time," said Mr. Johnson, after commenting upon the excellent condition of the roads to the south. "Leaving there at 2:15 we reached Rynn's at 7:45, an average of about 25 miles an hour. For the convenience of southbound autoists, The Bulletin might state that the best way is to turn to the right at Sand creek and go thence via Fort Klamath. That route is in fine shape now."
The first auto party to get to the rim of Crater Lake this year made the trip last week, said Mr. Johnson.

WEST TO CROSS MOUNTAINS

Governor Will Make Series of Good Roads Addresses.
EUGENE, July 20.—Governor West and State Highway Engineer H. W. Bowley will leave Eugene by auto on Tuesday, July 22, to cross the Cascades by the McKenzie pass to Prineville, where talks on good roads are to be made.
Governor West comes at the personal invitation of County Judge H. W. Thompson, who, in conjunction with the national forest service, is repairing the McKenzie road at some of the steep places, and making it passable for automobiles into Eastern Oregon throughout the season of no snows.
Engineer Bowley will co-operate with the Crook County Court and Central Oregon good road enthusiasts in planning better highways.
STATE BUYS LANDS.
It is understood that practically all the land required for the reservoir site of the Tumalo irrigation project, being built by the state adjacent to Laidlaw, has been purchased. Close to \$50,000 is being paid out for the tracts involved. Those whose property is being taken over by the state include the following: P. A. Woolley, Millard Triplett, Chas. Wimer, John Byers, R. H. Swisher, G. W. Horner and W. D. Clark.
MRS. CURSEY ACQUITTED.
In Justice Eastes' court Friday was tried the case of G. W. Arnold vs. Mrs. W. D. Cursey. Arnold, who loaned the Curseys \$250, protected by a mortgage covering household effects in the Mountain View Hotel,

alleged that the property listed as security actually was not on the premises, his complaint charging obtaining money under false pretenses. After hearing evidence and arguments of counsel, Justice Eastes dismissed Mrs. Cursey. District Prosecuting Attorney Wirtz was assisted by V. A. Forbes. H. H. DeArmond represented the defendant.
