Notice is hereby given that the streets committee of the city of Bend, Oregon, has made and filed its report with the city recorder showing the property benefited by the sewer heretofore ordered laid down and constructed on the following described streets, alleys and parcels of land, to-wit:

On the alley east of Bond street from Greenwood avenue to Kentucky street; on Kentucky street from the alley east of Bond street to the alley between Wall and Bond streets; on the alley east of Wall street from Kentucky street to Nevada street; on Ohio street from the alley east of Wall street to the alley west of Wall street; on the alley west of Wall street from Kentucky street to intersection with the south and west line of block one of Bend; thence on a line 10 feet distant and parallel to the west line of block one of Bond, and block one of North Addition to Bend, and continuing on the same straight line, in the nw 1/4 of the ne 1/4 sec. 32, T. 17 S., R. 12 E., W.
