

JEFFERSON CLIMBERS FIND RECORD OF ASCENT IN 1854

May and Blanding Return From Long Tramping Trip in Cascades—Trout Caught in Mountain Creek.

Donald May and Donald Blanding returned July 25 from a ten days' walking trip in the Mt. Jefferson country, which they pronounce the most attractive district imaginable for an outing such as theirs.

Starting out from Heising's on the Metolius river, they rambled through the country around Jefferson and made the ascent of the peak. At least going up from the southeast side, they got to within a hundred feet of the summit, further progress being barred by an almost perpendicular pinnacle.

Within less than 100 feet of the summit of Mt. Jefferson, Oregon, Wednesday, August 13, 1879. On this date, about noon, we, J. B. Waldo and E. W. Bingham of Portland, Oregon, climbed to this spot and deposited this record.

GREAT SCENIC ROUTE

Advantages of Central Oregon Highway Recognized.

Portland's attitude to the claims of Central Oregon for the Pacific Highway route, in preference to one through the Willamette valley, are well indicated in the following editorial from an issue of the Oregon Journal recently.

"Work is about to begin on the Portland-Hood River stretch of the Columbia highway. It is expected that the program will be finished by 1915.

"The determination to build the new highway opens up large possibilities for tourist travel through Eastern Oregon.

"No scenic route in the world would present attractions more splendid than a boulevard along the Columbia. If once the stretch to Hood River were completed and the leg from Hood River to The Dalles made modern, an enormous tourist business would be attracted.

of wonders. "Completion of both stretches would quickly raise the issue of Eastern rather than Western Oregon would not be the route for the Pacific Highway, so-called. The dirt roads of most of the Eastern Oregon counties are already sought by many travelers in preference to Western Oregon routes.

That the Central Oregon route is both the most feasible and the most attractive is coming to be generally conceded by those who have autoed in both districts. With the opening of the Columbia river highway another argument will be added to the many already provided by nature for the establishment of the through California-Washington road in Central Oregon.

This new Columbia road will open a wonderful scenic way directly from Bend to Portland. It will offer every kind of scenery, and pass through all kinds of country. As a stimulus to interior Oregon tourist travel its effects will be far reaching.

FREIGHT GOES TO WALDO LAKE

Cement and Lumber Taken in From Here 65 Miles.

That much freight will be taken in from Bend to the Waldo Lake reservoir work was stated here last week by Simon Kleydahl, in charge of construction operations there.

Last summer 50 tons of freight were taken in from here, chiefly cement and lumber. All food supplies are packed in from the west from Oakridge, the nearest railroad point.


