ON THE METOLIUS

ALLEN'S RANCH, Aug. 16.—The attractions of this section have drawn to the Metolius this summer the biggest crowd that has ever been known. Already there have been more than 175 here alone, with scores of tourists also at other points up the river.

The Dolly Varden trout are beginning to run and some good catches have been made recently. This is the off season for redds, although every day a number of big ones are taken. June and September are considered the best months for fishing in the Metolius.

The county has recently been working the road on the west side as far down as Heising's and it is now in good shape for autos. The entire road from Sisters is, in fact, in fine condition with the exception of the first few miles out from town. This has been cut up by wagons hauling lumber and is very dusty.

County Judge Springer and wife, who have been camping on the Metolius, recently went to Suttles lake. The government crew that is cruising timber and making a land classification are now camped about two miles from here, on the west side of the river.

Lookout William Usher has been busy recently packing to the top of Black Butte material for a cabin. The lumber was hauled to the foot of the butte and he packed it up with horses over the trail.

Forest Ranger Perry South of the Allingham station reports five fires in his district within the past week. Three were caused by lightning, one by the carelessness of a camper and the other by an Indian. One burned over about 10 acres before being extinguished. It was in a remote and rough country and was hard to get to after being discovered by the lookout.
