

# CONCERT WINS BIG AUDIENCE

## PACKED HOUSE HEARS PERFORMANCE

Musical Club Scored Hit When Trained Chorus, Soloists, Quartets and Pianists Performed Friday Night—The Program Presented

The concert given by the Musical Club at the New Bend Theatre last Friday proved in every way a most agreeable success, both as far as the quality of the entertainment offered was concerned and as regards attendance. Taken as a whole, the performance was well rendered and the numbers well selected, while the house was packed to capacity.

There were solos, trios, quartets and chorus singing, while on the piano two solos, a duet and a trio were rendered. The chorus, of 16 voices, was the largest that has yet performed here, and while some nervousness was apparent in its ranks, its singing showed careful choral training and excellent individual voices. The chorus and the individual singers, many of whom appeared for the first time in public, would no doubt have scored an even greater triumph had there been a second performance given with the confidence the success of their first appearance would have bred.

So far as there were any favorites with the audience, it seemed that Mrs. Ashley Forrest won the greatest measure of applause with her delightful singing of the quaint Indian love song, "From the Land of the Sky Blue Waters," by Cadman and Lehman's "If I Built a World for You." Miss Eastes and Mrs. Brinkley, in their solos, were most attractive. However, every number was generously applauded, and should the organization ever present another concert an enthusiastic audience is assured. All the women were dressed in white and each wore the dainty club pin made by Mrs. Powell.

**STOPS HAVOC OF BEETLES.**  
By a prompt campaign against a flourishing colony of bark beetles in the Ochoco National Forest, in Central Oregon, the government has eliminated a pest which threatened to destroy millions of feet of timber. Evidences of the presence of these destructive bark beetles, including the mountain pine beetle, were discovered and in 1912 the foresters cut and burned 3500 infected trees. This summer 40,000 infected trees were cut and as a result the beetle pest is believed to be under control.

**NEW SCHOOLHOUSES RISE.**  
Culver school district has let the contract for a four-room schoolhouse to cost \$5040. It will be one story, constructed of cement blocks. Two rooms will be completed now and the others as they are needed. It will be possible to add a second story. Metolius is also starting work on a new school house, and Sisters has a fine two-story building nearing completion.

**FLOUR MILL ADVERTISES.**  
The Bend Milling & Warehouse Company has had painted on its building a large sign advertising its wares, together with three large flour sacks showing the three leading brands of flour put out. The company is now selling to the state all the flour and feed used on the Tumalo project.

# SCHOOL BEGINS SEPTEMBER 2

## THIRTEEN TEACHERS IN DISTRICT

New Course of Study in High School, and Free Textbooks in Grades. Building to Be Erected in the Young Community.

School in Bend district No. 12, including the local grade and high schools, the Arnold and Young schools, will begin Tuesday, September 2, for a nine-month term. All the teachers have been engaged, and those not resident locally will begin to arrive soon to enter upon their duties. There will be 13 in the district, 11 of them in the Bend school. Four new instructors are among those for the Bend school.

Although the indications are for an enrollment that will be too large to be handled with the room available at present, the school board has not yet taken action to secure additional accommodations. However, it is expected that by the opening date there will be room for all who present themselves for instruction.

**Kenwood People Ask for School.**  
There was a meeting of the school board Saturday, at which a petition was presented from residents on the west side of the river asking for the location of a school on a site offered by the Kenwood Promotion Company. It was found on investigation that the pupils to be accommodated are of different grades, making the teaching of them in one building impractical, and on this account the petition was not granted.

Prof. Shouse outlined the new high school course adopted for the state and said it would not be possible to give it without an additional teacher. The board tentatively agreed to limit the courses at present and to provide no additional teacher.

Directors Ray, McKay and Hunter visited the Young school neighborhood Monday to ascertain the most central location for a schoolhouse. Heretofore this school has been held in a rented house, but it is now proposed that the district erect a building similar to the small ones used in Bend. Bids are being asked for on a house 22 by 28 feet in size.

The Arnold school house will be painted and provided with another blackboard, and rocks removed from the grounds so that they may be used for play.

An attempt will be made to bring both the Young and the Arnold school into closer relation with the town school than has heretofore existed.

**New Course and Free Books.**  
Preliminary to the opening of the Bend school, all high school pupils are requested by Principal Shouse to meet, if possible, in the high school room at 2 o'clock next Wednesday, August 27. A new course of study and new textbooks have been adopted and pupils will consider more carefully than heretofore what studies they will pursue.

Below the high school, textbooks will be loaned free of charge to pupils. It will be necessary to commence distribution of these books early in order that pupils may have them on hand at the very opening of school. The following appointments are made by Mr. Shouse for drawing books: Eighth grade, Thursday forenoon, August 28; 7th, Thursday afternoon; 6th, Friday forenoon; 5th, Friday afternoon; 4th, Saturday forenoon; 3rd, Saturday afternoon.

**Bonds Offered to Land Board.**  
The bond issue for the erection of a grade school building to cost \$20,000 has been offered to the Desert Land Board, as required by statute, and if the board does not buy the bonds, bids for them will be called for. They will bear interest at 5 1/2 per cent probably instead of 6 per cent, and the denomination will likely be \$1000. They will run 20 years, with option of redeeming them after 10 years. R. C. Sweatt of Spokane has been awarded the contract for drawing the plans for the building, which is to have eight class rooms and two unfinished rooms in the basement. If Mr. Sweatt accepts the board's offer, he will receive as his compensation 2 1/2 per cent of the estimated price, or \$500 if the full amount of the issue is used in the construction of the building.
