

# BIG EDITION WINS PRAISE

## DRAWS ATTENTION TO BEND

Individuals and Papers Comment The Bulletin's Annual Development Number Which Was Issued on July 30.

### "REASON FOR THOUGHT."

The current issue of The Bend Bulletin is called an "Annual Development Number" by its proprietor, George Palmer Putnam. Aside from the twelve pages of news that it customarily uses to "cover" Crook county and Middle Oregon, there are thirty-two pages devoted to exploitation of resources. Its reference to a modern electrical plant capable of serving a city of 25,000 people will be news to many whose ideas of that region consider its development in the primitive stage; so, also, will be the statement that "20,000,000,000 feet of timber is tributary to Bend," and that 227,000 acres offer profitable opportunity to settlers.
