

PROTECTS MIGRATORY BIRDS

Federal Statute Supercedes All State Codes Which May Be in Conflict

After October 1 migratory birds such as wild geese, ducks, pigeons, snipe and brant will be protected by a federal law. It supercedes all state laws that may conflict with it. "I believe the federal law is a long step toward preserving our game birds," says State Game Warden W. L. Finley. "It will bring about a uniformity in regulating hunting seasons, and will give the birds a chance to multiply. I am a member of the advisory committee appointed to assist the executive committee of the bureau to compile the regulations and am in complete accord with its actions."

"In Oregon several changes in the open season will obtain when the regulations go in force. The last legislature enacted measures making different open seasons for Oregon. Under the state code, the open season extends from September 15 to December 1, in Multnomah, Clatsop, Columbia, Tillamook and Coos counties. The open season for other Willamette valley counties extends from November 1 to February 15, while in eastern Oregon, ducks, geese, etc., can be hunted from September 15 to February 15.

"Under the federal law the season will open and close in all sections at the same time, after it goes into effect October 1. Until then, the state regulations will hold."

"I intend to have a bill introduced at the next legislature, changing the open seasons to conform with the federal regulations in regard to migratory birds, and this will remove all elements of conflict."

"As the federal code provides a daily closed season from sunset to sunrise, it will nullify our present law which allows duck and geese hunting half an hour before sunrise and half an hour after sunset."

LIDLAW, AUG. 19.—Engineer Laurgaard has issued a call for bids on 400 barrels of Portland cement for delivery at Bend between September 10 and 15. The advertisement has been sent to 25 dealers and the bids will be opened on the 25th. Prices have also been asked of 39 dealers on approximately 10,000 lineal feet of half-inch round mild

steel to be used for concrete reinforcing purposes. Bids will be opened the 27th, the steel to be delivered at Deschutes before September 20.
