## LIDLAW

(Special to The Bend Bulletin.)  
 LIDLAW, Aug. 25.—A beautiful and impressive ceremony took place in the church Sunday evening after services when Rev. A. O. Walker presented J. N. B. Gerking with a beautiful gold medal, in behalf of the people as an expression of appreciation of his excellent work during the last session of the Legislature in Salem. It was a complete surprise and he was deeply moved. He spoke a few words of gratitude, deprecating his own work and lauding the assistance given him by others interested in the movement. The medal is beautifully engraved, bearing Mr. Gerking's name and the inscription, "Father Tumalo Irrigation Project."

Bids have been asked for freighting of 200 barrels of cement from Bend to camp 1 and 100 barrels to camp 2, and of 7500 pounds of reinforcing steel from Deschutes to camps 1 and 2.

Secretary of State Olcott and State Treasurer Kay, both members of the Desert Land Board, visited the Tumalo project Tuesday morning, the 19th. Both expressed their surprise at the showing that had been made in so short a time. Project Engineer Laugaard took them as far as Paisley on an inspection trip of other projects, leaving Laidlaw on the afternoon of the 19th. He returned on the 22nd.

Eight heavy horses from The Bend Company have been put on the work as plow teams.

During the week work on the diversion dam at camp 1 was started and good progress is being made.

Contractors Dencer and Joe Rock at camp 2 are pushing their work hard and making a good showing. Mr. Hutchins has nearly finished his contract.

Contractor J. J. Adams has moved his outfit on the work awarded to him and his men are staying at camp 4.

Each camp claims to have the best cook on the work and to take the judgment of those who visit all the camps frequently, the last meal is always the best regardless of the camp at which it may have been taken. The camps are very fortunate in securing four cooks of this character.

The Q. A. F. Club will meet with Mrs. Schaller Wednesday, September 2. Meetings are to be held only every other week hereafter, instead of weekly as has been the habit. The club gave a ball at Laidlaw Friday evening, the 22nd, which was a very successful affair, and a most pleasant evening was spent. A number of Redmond and Bend young people were present.
