

FAILURES UNDER CAREY ACT

Change Must Be Made in Irrigation Methods, Says Governor.

SALEM, Aug. 25.—Pronouncing all Carey Act irrigation projects in the state failures, Governor West, on returning to the city from a tour of Eastern Oregon with Secretary of the Interior Lane, emphatically declared that if the state's arid lands are to be reclaimed, work must be done by the state or federal government independently or through co-operation of the two.

"We had a flying trip," said the Governor in speaking of his tour, "but we had time to show Secretary Lane the possibilities in this state. We visited the Central Oregon Irrigation project, and then the Madras country—a vast stretch of territory which it is contemplated to reclaim by the government and the state in the future, and for which surveys are now being made.

"Take the Central Oregon Irrigation project, for instance. It has already cost the promoters \$1,250,000 and to complete it an outlay of \$175,000 more will be necessary. Now, that sum cannot be easily raised, and if its promoters fail, then the state is merely obliged to complete the project, for its name is involved in the concern."

GRAZING REDUCTION ASKED. WASHINGTON, D. C.—Senator Lane, at the request of the National Wool Growers' Association, has asked the forest service to make a general reduction of rates for grazing sheep in the national forests. Forester Graves says he will take up the question with Secretary Houston of the Department of Agriculture as soon as the latter returns to the national capital.

WEEKLY MARKET REPORT. NORTH PORTLAND, Aug. 22.—Receipts for the week were 853 cattle, 344 calves, 640 hogs, 8520 sheep and 1 horse. Cattle receipts have been lighter than usual for the week, with bulk of offerings going readily at slightly higher prices. Both steers and cows have moved at an advance of about 15c. Choice steers sold as high as 8.50c. Best cows and heifers brought 7c and prime veal calves up to 9c. Hog arrivals have been very light. Prices advanced 15c for the midweek offerings and the load sold Friday as high as 9.15c. Sheep receipts have been liberal, with prices holding a little better on good stuff.

DR. NICHOL ENTERS MINISTRY

Real Estate Man, Formerly at Bend, Quits Secular Vocation.

Old-timers here will be interested in the following dispatch to the Portland Journal from Hood River: "Dr. W. B. Nichol, who has been a practicing physician for about 14 years, and who has been in the real estate business in Hood River valley for several years, announced from the Grace United Brethren church pulpit Sunday evening that he would quit the secular vocations in life and enter the ministry. Dr. Nichol preached his first sermon in Hood River Sunday evening to a crowded house. He is a member of the Methodist Episcopal church and plans to enter the evangelistic field of that denomination. He stated he had felt the call to the ministry for a number of years but had resisted it in his secular pursuits.

Dr. Nichol was formerly a resident here, owning the drug store that is now Patterson's. He is also remembered for his connection with a deal for the John Slemore place. He bought this property for \$5000, paying \$1000 down and giving a mortgage for the balance. After having sold off a lot of timber and otherwise profiting from the place, Dr. Nichol seemed to think the property was not worth the \$5000 yet to be paid and the mortgage was foreclosed. At the sale the place was bought by the Bend Townsite Company for \$18,000.
