IMPEACHMENT VS. RECALL.

A favorite argument of enemies of the recall is that in impeachment a political body has all that the recall affords, and that it is a more orderly procedure, one less likely to be made the instrument of popular and momentary passion and therefore better suited to the purpose of getting out of office those who have shown themselves unfit.

There last fall the Democratic party elected its candidate for governor on a platform pledging the passage of a direct primary law. In the legislative session which followed, this pledge was violated by the express command of the boss of Tammany Hall. The governor rebelled, took the fight to the people and after a state-wide campaign called a special session of the assembly to consider direct primary legislation.

With the recall, all this would be impossible. With the recall, if a number of voters thought Sulzer ought to be put out, they could bring him to an election. If then a majority thought that he ought to stay in, he would stay.

No one can say that the people want Sulzer out or think him unfit for his office and after all they, and not Murphy, are the ones most interested.

Between impeachment, because of the passion of an individual, and recall, because of the passion of the people, we choose the latter.

Notice is hereby given that on the 15th day of September, 1913, the District School Board of School District No. 12 in and for Crook county, state of Oregon, will sell to the highest bidder \$23,000 of District School Bonds of said district; said bonds shall be negotiable coupon bonds of said district in the sum of \$23,000, shall bear interest at the rate of 5 1/2 per cent per annum payable semi-annually, said bonds shall be redeemable at the pleasure of the district, but due and absolutely payable twenty (20) years from date thereof; principal and interest shall be payable in lawful money of the United States at the office of the treasurer of Crook county, state of Oregon, or at the fiscal agency of the state of Oregon in the city and state of New York, at the option of the purchaser; said bonds shall not be sold for less than par value; said bonds are issued pursuant to Section 2, Chapter 172 of the General Laws of Oregon for 1913.

All bids must be accompanied by a certified check in the sum of \$500, payable to said District School Board; all bids shall be directed to H. J. Overturf, District Clerk of School District No. 12, Crook county, Oregon. The board reserves the right to reject any and all bids.

The assessed valuation of said district is \$1,094,652.00. The amount of outstanding notes, warrants and bonds of said district is \$6506.00.

All bidders shall make arrangements to secure blank bonds in accordance with provisions of Section 3, Chapter 172, General Laws of Oregon for 1913.
