

### BEND'S INFANT INDUSTRY SHOWS STEADY PROGRESS

**During Past Six Months 17 Girls and 11 Boys Have Been Added to the Population.**

Announcement was made the first of March by The Deschutes Banking & Trust Co. that it would give a bank book with a dollar deposit credited therein to every Bend-born infant between March 1 and September 1 whose name was presented to the bank. It was stated that this offer was made to "encourage the infant industry."

The prediction was made at that time by The Bulletin that, with this encouragement, the industry would no doubt thrive, and such seems to have been the case.

### ROCK TEST IS GOOD

**Non-porous Lava Splendid for Road Making, Says O. A. C. Man.**

Upon instructions of the council, City Engineer Young recently sent samples of lava rock from Lava and Pilot buttes to the Oregon Agricultural College to have tests made to find out their value for road-making purposes. A report has been received showing that the non-porous lava is "suitable if properly crushed and graded for any class of construction mentioned in your letter. Its resistance to wear is only medium, but for medium or light traffic would be sufficient. Many water-bound macadam roads as well as city pavements have been built in the state with similar rock and are proving satisfactory."

The report states that the cinders are too soft for any permanent improvement.

Gravel from a pit three-fourths of a mile from Bend was also sent to be tested and the report says regarding it:

"This gravel is extremely hard and would make a pavement suitable for the heaviest traffic. Also, in addition to the above tests I examined the gravel as to its suitability for concrete. The sample tested showed very little silt or other undesirable matter and I believe the material will make very good concrete."

The city engineer also took up the matter of paving and road making with State Highway Engineer Bowby, and in a letter Mr. Bowby states that he will be here in three or four weeks and go into this in detail.

### CAUSES BREAK IN CANAL

**Intoxicated Man Turns Extra Head of Water into North Lateral.**

A break in the North lateral of the Arnold Irrigation Company's system was caused last Thursday by the turning of about two-thirds of the entire flow of water of the Arnold canal into the lateral. The break occurred at the White place east of town. It is believed that an intoxicated man caused the trouble by placing a plank across the Pine Forest lateral, thereby diverting into the North lateral nearly all the water that was flowing into the former ditch.

Aside from the expense of repairing the break, the misdeed resulted in the settlers along the North lateral being without water for several days while repairs were being made.

### WEST AND BOARD SQUABBLE

**Governor Opposes Time Extension for Morson Project at La Pine.**

The Morson-West controversy, of several years' standing, is again in the public eye. This time the Governor is pitted against the other members of the Desert Land Board, the crux of the controversy being whether or not there should be an extension of time for completion of the Morson irrigation project at La Pine.

Recently at a meeting of the land board which was not attended by the Governor, the board went on record as favoring such an extension and made a recommendation to this effect to the Secretary of the Interior. This the Governor vigorously opposed, and statements and counter statements are being issued by either side to the squabble. The outcome of the matter will be watched with interest by people of this section.
