Some of those dear old experiences, memories of which one fondly cherishes without the least desire that they come to him a second time, befell L. C. Furst and J. C. Rhodes on their recent trip to Burns by auto truck. It was a real touch of "high life in the far West," especially to Mr. Rhodes. The two got back Friday.

Leaving here Friday, September 19, with a load of freight on the auto truck, they reached Brookings that night and next morning proceeded on towards Burns. They had not gone many miles until a bearing had turned out. A new one was put in and the journey resumed. It too, soon burned out and as they had no more extras they had to halt. There was no settler living near but about three and a half miles away they spotted a cabin and hiked to it. They found it was deserted; they broke in. Wood rats were in possession, but they cooked some rice that was there and spent the night in the filthy hut. Next morning they went back to the truck and expected some one would be along to "give them a lift," but no help came, and late Sunday they decided to boot it to Gap Ranch, about 15 miles away. They had no grub and for their Sabbath dinner Rhodes shot a jackrabbit with his rifle. This they broiled over a sagebrush fire (what delicious flavor!) by suspending it on a wire, and they ate it without salt or bread or water. It was like being "carried to the skies, on flowery beds of ease," was that grub and that hike, so Rhodes thinks—not.

But they reached the Gap ranch and adjourned there a few days until Furst's other truck came along from Burns, picked them up and proceeded on to the broken down truck. The load was transferred and taken on to Burns, along with J. C. Rhodes and Furst. On the return trip Rhodes shot a couple of coyotes and skinned one, and he says that, too, was some (un-)pleasant job which he never intends to repeat. The pelt will be mounted and kept by him as a souvenir of a never-to-be-forgotten trip from Bend to Burns and return, and if he ever takes another trip like it hurry with him to Salem, on the Willamette, he says, where all the good old lunatics ought to go.
