Chas. Thompson, for driving county auto 3 1/2 days allowed \$10.50. County bonding petition granted and election ordered.

Petition of Central Oregon Investment Co., vacation of Mayflower addition to the town of Madras, granted.

Wrongful assessment. Petition of N. G. Taylor, granted.

County Clerk. Statement of scalp warrants to September 2nd, \$196.50, granted.

Pension warrants, ordered beginning of pensions shall date from approval by Juvenile Court, unless otherwise ordered.

Application. James W. Fleetwood ordered temporary assistance.

C. L. Benson, wrongful assessment, rebate allowed, \$5.50.

Andrew Behrens, supervisor of District 29. Ordered warrant in his favor for \$100. Tools ordered as requested.

County auto. It is ordered the Clerk issue warrants for gas bills for county auto with a very distinct understanding that the car shall be as much at the disposal of one county official as another, viz., the sheriff shall be allowed no preference, except during sessions of Circuit Court.

Building sheriff's office. Bids for same being carefully considered. The bid of John B. Shipp is found to be the most satisfactory and the contract is awarded to Shipp.

Building bridge on Crooked river. Matter referred to County Judge.

Warrant drawn on road fund to P. T. Monroe for \$700. Clerk ordered to cancel same.

Sheriff's office. Deputy Engineer Peoples, instructed to supervise work on same.

In the Commissioners' Court for the County of Crook, State of Oregon. In the matter of a Special Election for Submitting Bonding Issue for Roads to the Electors.

Whereas, a petition is now presented praying that an election be ordered for the submission to all the voters of the County of Crook, State of Oregon, the question of bonding the said County for the sum of Two Hundred Thousand (\$200,000) Dollars, to be expended in the construction, under the supervision of the State Highway Commissioner of the State of Oregon, of a permanent road, and

Whereas, it satisfactorily appears therefrom that said petition bears the signature of 382 registered voters of the said County of Crook, said number being more than one-fourth of the greatest number of votes cast at the next preceding general election in said County for the candidates for judge of the Supreme Court, making it mandatory upon this Court to call a special election for the purpose therein set forth, and

Whereas, it is the sense of this Court that should said bond issue be approved by the people that all or nearly all of the direct road tax should be expended on the improvement of east and west roads in the County and that is hereby declared to be the policy of this Court for the coming session should said bond issue be approved, and

Whereas, we have good reason to believe that the State of Oregon will adopt the permanent road hereinafter described and upon which the said bond issue is based as a state road, assuring its excellence as well as its permanent maintenance.

Therefore it is hereby ordered, that an election be, and the same is hereby called to be, held throughout the County of Crook, State of Oregon, at the usual polling places in each precinct therein, on Tuesday, the 4th day of November, 1913, the polls to open and close at the same times as are now provided by law for the general state elections, at which election there shall be submitted to the voters a proposition to construct a permanent highway in said Crook County beginning near the point where the present Prineville-The Dalles road crosses the northern boundary of said County, running thence in a general southerly direction through the towns of Madras, Metolius, Culver, Prineville, Redmond, Laidlaw, Centrallo, Bend and La Pine, terminating where the present La Pine-Silver Lake road crosses the southern boundary of said County for which purpose, if said proposition be approved, the county will issue bonds to the extent of Two Hundred Thousand (\$200,000) Dollars, the said bonds to run 20 years and bear interest at the rate of 6 per cent per annum; and the County Clerk is hereby directed to cause the proper notices to be issued and posted, in pursuance of the laws of the State of Oregon made and provided by the assembly of the Twenty-seventh Legislature of said State.
