B. E. Davis has about finished clearing 10 acres more of his claim.

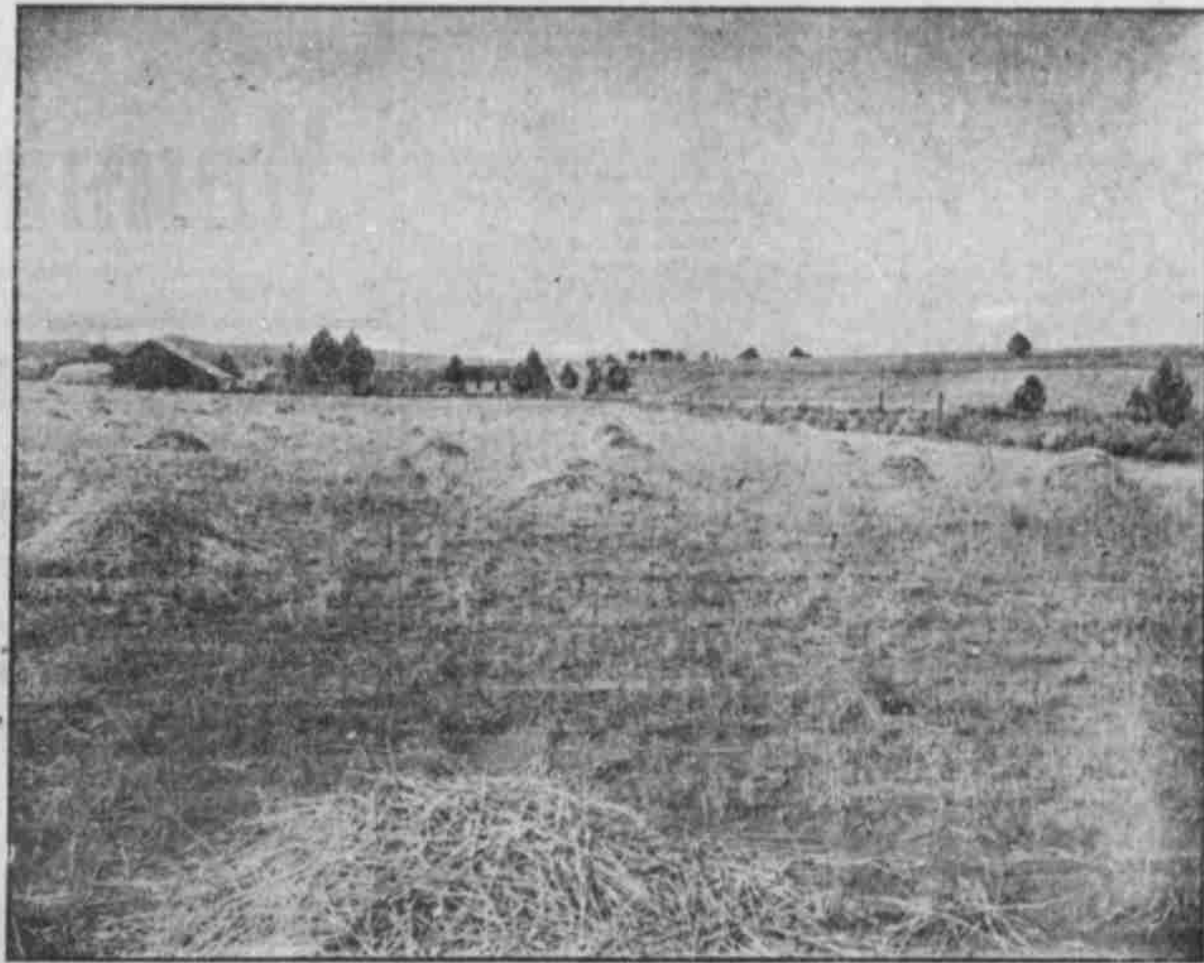
