ACCIDENT PROVES FORTUNATE

Mrs. C. V. Barto Dragged by Horses When Tongue Bolt Fails.

Dragged out of the hack she was driving and stepped on by one of the horses, Mrs. C. V. Barto, who lives seven miles northeast of Bend, had a narrow escape from serious injuries last Wednesday evening.

The bolt holding the double tree to the tongue came out and the team she was driving started to run. Mrs. Barto held on to the lines and was pulled over the dashboard and down into the road, where she lost hold of one line. The team circled around her and in the melee one horse stepped on her. Thanks to a heavy sheepskin coat, no injury was sustained.

The accident occurred near the West home. Mr. Barto was called from the ranch by phone and came in, straightening out the horses and rig and taking his wife home.

SEWER CASE HEARING ON.

Before Judge Bradshaw at The Dalles this afternoon is being heard the suit brought by various property owners to enjoin the city from collecting the assessments levied on account of the sewer construction. A temporary injunction against the city was issued some weeks ago and at this afternoon's hearing it will be decided whether or not this injunction will be made permanent or dismissed. Vernon A.
