

FEDERAL GAME WARDENS SOON

NEW LAW WILL BE ENFORCED

Whole Country Divided Into 13 Dis-
tricts—United States to Co-Operate
With State Game Departments.
Five-Year Closed Season.

The United States Department of Agriculture announces that arrangements have been made to set in motion the machinery to make effective the regulations protecting migratory birds, which went into effect October 1.

A comprehensive plan for the enforcement of the new law has been made. Under this plan the country is divided into 13 districts, each in charge of an experienced inspector. Each Inspector will have about 25 men in his district. The Inspector for Oregon, Washington and western Idaho, which comprise the 13th district, is L. Alva Lewis, who will have offices at 809 Yeron Building, Portland. Mr. Lewis has previously had charge of the federal game reservations in the Pacific district and will continue to exercise supervision over them as well as the new federal migratory bird laws.

By November 1 it is expected to have the new wardens appointed, their stations assigned and preliminary arrangements made to commence field work.

Arrangements have been made by which the Department of Agriculture and the various state game departments will work in close co-operation in enforcing the laws, so that all state wardens will co-operate in keeping down violations and a number of the state wardens will be given commissions as United States wardens for this purpose.

The new federal law provides a five-year closed season on the following game birds which it has heretofore been lawful to hunt in season under state laws: Band-tailed pigeons, curlews, wood-ducks and all the shore birds in Oregon except the black-breasted and golden plover, Wilson or jack snipe and greater and lesser yellowlegs.

WEEKLY MARKET LETTER.

NORTH PORTLAND, Oct. 25.—Receipts for the week have been: Cattle 1788, calves 57, hogs 5347, sheep 2558. Reaction in the cattle market set in Wednesday after an auspicious opening Monday. Receipts have been abnormally large and killers are temporarily well supplied. Prime steers dropped to \$7.50 and ewes to \$6.50. Trade was slow the last half. The hog market was sharply lower this week; this outlet narrowed at mid-week and swine values were shaded from \$8.75 to \$8.50. By Friday the trade was very sticky, buyers indifferent and \$8.35 was the limit of bids. A liberal quotation was \$8.50 and \$8.25. There was a very slow and uninteresting sheep trade. Sheep for the most part were in the lamb section and owing to very poor quality these did not bring more than \$5.10. Generally the mutton and lamb markets are steady to firm.

CALL FOR BIDS.

Bids will be received by H. J. Overton, clerk of school district No. 12, at Bend, Oregon, for the construction of a school house in accordance with plans and specifications prepared by Sweet, Levesque & Co., architects, 312 Mohawk block, Spokane, Washington. Plans may be had from the clerk of the district at Bend, or from the architects at Spokane. A deposit of \$20.00 will be required before the plans can be taken out. The deposit will be returned when the plans are returned in good condition by the time agreed upon. About four days will be allowed for figuring the general contract, about two days time for the plumbing contract, and about six days for the heating contract. Bids

will be received by the said clerk of the school board, at Bend, Oregon, until eight o'clock p. m. November 10, at which time they will be publicly opened. The certified check of the lowest bidder and of the next lowest will be retained in each case. All other checks will be returned to unsuccessful bidders forthwith.
