SHOCKING CONDITIONS EXPOSED

County Papers Describe Depravity of Local Municipal Officials and Vice of Other Guardians of the Law in These Bend Digging's.

The unsuspecting citizens of Bend who have labored under the misapprehension that the town has been a pretty good burg for many months past, may learn the true condition and the utter depravity of local affairs from the following clippings appearing in county papers, which are always desirous of aiding a worthy cause. From the clippings the misguided voters here may also ascertain just who are the sturdy champions of the law and morality; doubtless it will be a matter of congratulation that the existing shocking state of affairs is to be brought to an end. Enthusiastic citizens are reported as saying that the splendid spasm of activity evidenced just now immediately before the local municipal election should be borne in mind next November at the general election.

Authorities Determined.
(Crook County Journal, Prineville)
The county authorities are determined to stamp out gambling at Bend. Deputy Sheriff Wenzel arrested two saloon keepers last week on a gambling charge. They were bound over to the grand jury. The Bend city authorities will take no action tending to prevent the violations of the gambling law so the matter has devolved upon the sheriff. Deputy Wenzel has orders to keep right on the job.

The Pot Boils.

Bend, Ore.—The political pot is beginning to boil as the time for the municipal election on December 2 approaches. The present mayor, G. R. Putnam, it is alleged, has permitted gambling and other violations of city ordinances, and the reform movement, backed by the Crook county sheriff and his deputies at Bend, is starting to clean up the town. Two bartenders working in the saloon of McGrath & Co. were arrested and held to the grand jury last week, and yesterday Myers & Wilkey, who conduct a saloon, were both bound over to the grand jury. The charge in both cases was gambling. The place of McGrath & Co. was closed by the city authorities for keeping open after midnight, in violation of a city ordinance. The present administration alleges that the suits are brought at this time to discredit the administration, while the county authorities say it is the beginning of a municipal cleaning of the city.

GRIZZLY BEAR THAT HAS TRAIL THROUGH THE TOWN

Tracks Measure 14 Inches and Its Weight is 1800. This Being Information Woman Would Verify.

"I would like to verify the story of a big grizzly that wended its way over a trail through your town some time ago. This is the information that I got from a couple who at one time lived in Bend:

"That every year the bear traveled from the Cascade to the Blue Mts., going from one place to the other fall and spring. That he weighed 1800 lbs. and his tracks measured 14 inches. That many hunting parties sought to kill him and that he was finally caught. Can you give me any additional information, and is this correct as far as it goes?"

"I would like to know anything more of interest about it—habits of grizzlies in general, when this one was shot, etc."

The above is the contents of a letter received recently by the postmaster here from a lady in Spokane and turned over to The Bulletin to be answered. While this newspaper is by no means very versed in grizzly bear lore, it begs to present the bare facts regarding this bear, more details no doubt being obtainable from two local men who are recognized bearologists, namely, John Steidl and Hugh O'Kane.

But to proceed to the bare facts: The first mention made of the bear referred to above was in Cain's Diary, a transcript of which was published in The Bulletin some months ago. It is stated there that it was first seen eating huckleberries on the side of Mount Mazama and at that time attracted the attention of Cain's thirteenth wife owing to its huge size. Bill Steidl, shortly after he came to Bend, saw it for the first time on its way to the Blue Mountains on April 1. Ten years later Theodore Nimrod Roosevelt and 500 Rough Riders invaded Central Oregon and captured the bear. It fought desperately and gave T. N. R. an awful whack in the face which injured his eyesight to such an extent that he has had to wear glasses ever since. While he was momentarily blind, the grizzly escaped. In making his getaway the bear ran against Mount Mazama with such impetus that this lofty peak was overthrown and disappeared and in its stead we have Crater Lake today.

The next important episode in this grizzly's life was when Jim Hill was here on October 5, 1911, and drove the golden spike. So pleased was the grizzly that the railroad had arrived—he was as fond of listening to the melody of the engine whistle as to the sound of Bend's electric fire alarm siren—that he came up to the Empire Builder's private car and offered to rub noses.

But the end came at last. Old age had got in its work and dimness had spread over the once lustrous eyes of Bruin the Terrible. It was in the spring of 1913. He was making his accustomed migration eastward and as usual wended his way one windy night along Bond street, in Bend. The automatic city scales had been set and he passed over them. His weight was recorded at 18,000 pounds. In a new cement sidewalk a little further up the street he left the imprint of his right hind foot, and careful measurement showed a track 14 feet in diameter. Next morning when the crew working on the sewer tunnel in Lytle went into the ground to resume operations they found the grizzly wedged in the tunnel—he had mistaken it for a cave and had smothered. His remains were interred in the city's potterfield, near the penthouse. Selah.
