

**NIXON RESIDENCE BURNS**

Early Morning Blaze Thursday Destroyed Park Addition Home.

On Thursday morning the residence of L. A. W. Nixon in Park Addition burned to the ground, all of the household and personal effects being destroyed. Mr. Nixon estimates his loss at about \$1000, \$250 of which was covered by insurance.

At 5 o'clock Mr. Nixon got up, lit a fire in the stove and went to the barn to feed his team. Five minutes later he saw the house in flames, which evidently had caught in some way around the stove. The fire burned so rapidly that it was impossible to save anything. Mr. Nixon detaching most of his attention to getting the team and wagon from the barn which stood close to the house. A hose line was connected up but not sufficiently soon to be of any use.

At the time of the fire Mrs. Nixon was out at the Nixon ranch where she will remain. The house is erected. This will be done at the old location as soon as possible, says Mr. Nixon.

**A BAKOWSKI RECORD FOUND**

Missing Photographer Left Notation Near Crater Lake.

"Passed thru here 1-30-1911. B. B. Bakowski."

That notation was found recently on the headquarters barn at Crater Lake. It was scratched with a pencil by Bakowski, the Polish photographer, who perished while taking winter pictures in the national park in January, two years ago. The line was 16 feet from the ground level, indicating the depth of snow.

Bakowski was well known here, having taken many photographs in this region. He went into the park in December and in February a searching party found much of his equipment.

**CENTRAL OREGON BULLETIN**

Forthcoming O. A. C. Publication of Interest to Crook County Farmers.

CORVALLIS, Nov. 5.—A bulletin giving the results of the denotation work in Crook county and the experiment station work in Sherman and Harney counties, together with a discussion of tillage and cropping methods for Central Oregon, is now practically ready for the printer and should be off the press in about a month.

This bulletin will give in some detail a report of the yields obtained from different crops and methods of farming tried out by the O. A. C. in Crook county in 1912, and is expected to prove of great interest to the farmers of that region.

**WEEKLY MARKET REPORT.**

NORTH PORTLAND, Nov. 1.—Receipts for the week have been: Cattle 1719, calves 69, hogs 3813, sheep 6531. An enormous volume of business has been transacted in the cattle market during the last five days, particularly Monday and Tuesday. Receipts totaled a 1913 record for a short period and as they followed an abnormal liquidation the week before, beef output would have been hopelessly closed if prices had been firm. It was a buyers' market mostly, but good steers did not sell under \$7.25. The bulk of steer transactions averaged \$6.75 to \$7.15. Butcher stock was weak only in spots. Cows and heifers sold sharply lower, but bulls and stags maintained some degree of firmness. A small lot of heifers selling at \$6.75 featured. The bulk of cow staff brought \$6 to \$6.25, with occasional sales in small lots at \$6.35 to \$6.50. The swine market suffered very little from an advanced liquidation and steady bear pressure. Best light hogs were sold at \$8.25 and \$8.30 right up to the close and demand was steady. The week's receipts have been above the average, both in quantity and in quality. Smooth heavy stock brought good prices. Trade does not seem to be oversupplied at present, but November receipts are likely to be heavy. Sheep house came to life once more, the first opportunity it has had in a fortnight. Receipts were not record-breaking, but of fair volume and a good proportion was wethers, lambs and yearlings. Ewe stock was not choice, but demand is good for this class. Prime yearlings are up a quarter to \$4.75 and sold off the ears Friday at \$5.10 and one load on the fill at \$5, but they were exceptional—the best seen on this market. The lamb trade is firmer at \$5.75, although few sales were made due to short supply. Generally the lamb and sheep markets are steady to higher.
