

A LETTER FROM MR. SPRINGER

COUNTY JUDGE USES HIS COLUMN

Communication Relates to Demonstration Farms Controversy and Savagely Attacks J. E. Morson of La Pine Land Company.

The Bulletin has received the following letter from County Judge G. Springer. At the bottom Mr. Springer wrote in these words: "For the Springer column," so that there might be no misunderstanding regarding what was to be done with the letter. It is printed verbatim as it was written, spelling and all:

Prineville, Oregon, Nov. 14, 1913. My Editor:

In the November 5th (sic) issue of The La Pine Inter-Mountain appeared a headline like this:

"Judge Springer's letter a Per- version"

Under the above heading an effort is made to show that Crook County was delinquent in paying the second half of its contribution. It might be easy to stuff a lie down the throats of the taxpayers, were it not for the records; the records however show that the county paid its contribution promptly and therefore proves it was no fault of Crook County that its demonstration work was not carried forward. As to the County Judge seeking to avoid a public controversy, we admit that it is a fact, but when it became apparent that only publicity would bring forth the facts, the Judge "hauled her out" and now we know the truth. The college agreed to carry on the work two seasons, the county paid its second installment as any one may learn from the records on January 4th, 1913, thereby fulfilling its part of the contract. If the college faculty desired assistance to collect the balance of the contribution it failed to make its wishes known, even after the Judge offered his services. The Judge has a letter on file from the college officials stating that the failure to report the status of the matter was due to a misunderstanding between the college officials.

The County Judge therefore has no further cause to antagonize the state institution, but is ready and anxious for perfect co-operation. The college has endorsed the idea of fifty or more small tracts as the Judge suggested. The appropriation is made so now if old man Morson and other speculators will be patient we hope they will be able ere long to unload their sick pine town lots and lands for at least all they are worth. The county court however is more interested in the farmers than the promoters and the County Judge has enough faith in the good sense of the voters that he dares defy all grafters and promoters, so brother Morson if you have a "recall" up your sleeve (sic), turn it on.
