

SHERIFF GIVES TAX FIGURES

TOTAL COLLECTION ON 1912 TAX ROLL

Nearly \$300,000 Turned Over to the County Treasurer up to November 1—Henn Leads in All Payments, Both For School and City.

Sheriff Frank Elkins has made a report of the taxes collected by his office on account of the 1912 tax roll up to November 1, 1913. Out of a total tax roll of \$322,956.78 there has been collected \$290,644.78, leaving delinquent and unpaid \$32,322.29, after making allowance for rebates and other deductions.

Bend leads in amount of taxes paid by nearly \$1000, and the local school district pays a tax nearly three times as large as any other district pays, as well as bearing its share of the county school taxes.
