

CURSEY NOW BEING TRIED

THREE COUNTS ARE BROUGHT

Issuing Worthless Checks Given Consideration by Grand Jury—True Bills Brought in Against Myers and Wilkey—Moore is Let Off.

PRINEVILLE, Dec. 3.—W. D. Cursey is now being tried on three counts brought against him by the grand jury, for issuing worthless checks. The case against him for mortgaging property to the Bend Milling & Warehouse Co. was dropped. A large number of witnesses have been subpoenaed from Bend in this case.

The grand jury returned a true bill against E. C. Myers and Fred J. Wilkey, Bend saloonmen, on a charge of allowing gambling in their place of business. There are several counts.

The gambling charges against Silvia Parish and Charles Mason, bartenders of Bend, were dismissed as C. J. Stauffer, the complaining witness, failed to appear.

The charges against John A. Moore and Florence Meier were also dismissed, no true bills being found.

A true bill was found against B. Struble, who was bound over from Bend on a statutory charge in which appeared the name of Mrs. W. R. Gay.

W. D. CLARK GETS \$1650.

PRINEVILLE, Dec. 3.—The only important case thus far ground out by the circuit court was that of the State of Oregon vs. W. D. Clark. Clark is a rancher, and the State needs about 50 acres of his land for the reservoir of the Tumalo project. The State, represented by Attorney Crawford, sought to have damages for the land allowed at a basis of \$10. H. H. De Armond of Bend represented Clark, and despite the fact that his opposing council was an attorney general secured the handsome award of \$1650 for his client from the jury.

PRINEVILLE, Nov. 29.—Judge G. Springer has been shorn. He returned Saturday from "the outside" entirely devoid of the mustache and whiskers which have added to his fame at one time and another. "I'm in disguise now," said the Judge. "When Morson comes to town I expect to hire a man with whiskers to meet him, so that perhaps he'll get the trouble instead of me."

Bend folks who think that W. D. Cursey, defaulting ex-hotel man, is languishing in the county jail, have another guess coming. Instead of getting thin on bread and water, or whatever Sheriff Elkins gives the prisoners for Thanksgiving dinner, Cursey is fatter than ever and lives in comfort, more or less at large, and with his wife. He seems to be a "trustee" and has entire liberty, except that he sleeps in the jail.

Ex-Sheriff Halfour is now a candidate for city marshal in Prineville.

Warren Brown says that his office, the county clerk's, has shown a net profit of \$3000 a year for the last three years.

Prineville's city attorney, T. E. J. Duffy, is having his troubles, too. Somebody's suing the city for \$5000 damages because his name was put on the blacklist.

The auto fare between Redmond and Prineville is now \$3 one way and \$5.50 for the round trip. That means less net profit for the jurors and witnesses on mileage.

Frank Elkins says he has run the county car 11,500 miles since March.

8. Reading—One-half from the new course of study and one-half from oral reading.
9. School Laws of Oregon—1913 edition.
10. Theory and Practice—Colgrove, "The Teacher and the School."
11. Writing—The Outlook writing system, or The Palmer Method of Business Writing.
12. Algebra—Wells: Algebra for

- School Algebra, by Well and Hart.
 13. Composition—Herrick and Damon, or Kimball's English Grammar.
 14. Literature, American—Newcomer's American Literature, and classics listed below.
 15. Physiology—Krohn, or Conn and Buddington.
 16. Psychology—Read: An Introduction to Psychology.
