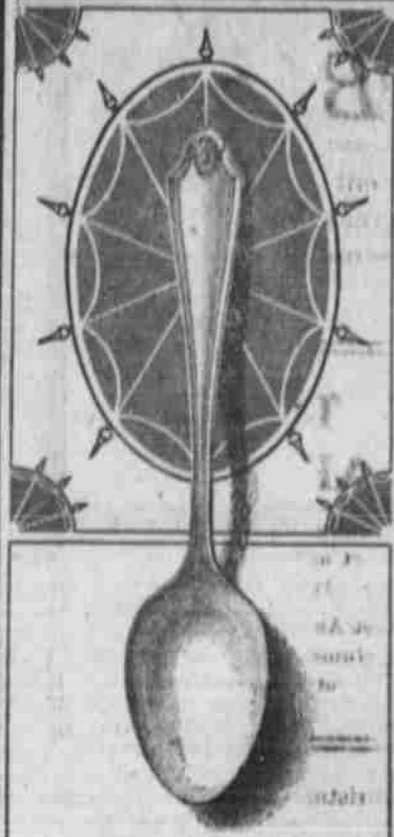


COMMUNITY SILVER
