

O'KANE BEATS TAFT'S RECORD

Local Hotel Man Has Lost 93 Pounds in Last Six Months.

A news dispatch from the East last week told of the happiness of ex-President Taft over the loss of 69 pounds of flesh since he left the White House last March. His record may be quite a wonderful one, but there is a man in Bend who has it outdistanced.

This is Hugh O'Kane, the genial presiding genius at the Bend Hotel. Mr. O'Kane six months ago weighed 342 pounds, but now tips the scales at only 249, and is still going down. He has lost 93 pounds in six months as compared to Taft's 69 pounds in eight months.

The secret of this disappearance of flesh is some tablets which Mr. O'Kane is taking and a certain amount of dieting, although he does not have to starve himself or anything like that. His health is fine and he is able to get about with more agility than he has shown in a long time.

BUILDING A RAILROAD.

What It Means When the Contractors Begin Operations.

With the right of way established, a great army of men enter into the field. The company does not build its own road. It is turned over to contractors and is usually let in sections of from 200 to 300 miles.

The contractor must live up to certain specifications, just as though he were building a house, and he furnishes everything—men, teams, machinery, food and material. Few people realize what this means. A contractor must be very near to a king.

For instance, there is the Hazelton section in the mountains. It is less than 200 miles in length. Before a single shovel or pick was engaged in the building of this section the contractors had to equip themselves with a fleet of steamboats at a cost of \$200,000. They had to build scores of camps at from \$2,000 to \$4,000 a camp. Each of these centers had to be stocked with provisions, supplies and materials almost before a builder was brought in. Before these contractors moved a shovelful of earth or fired a single blast they had spent over \$6,000,000.

Each contractor's camp is like a small city, with its stores, hospital, scores of sleeping shacks, kitchens, dining rooms, warehouses and barns.

WHITE PROPERTY SOLD

Two Business Corners and Pilot Butte Acreage Go At Auction.

Administrator A. C. Lucas was up from Redmond Thursday and put up at public auction the property of the J. W. White estate. All of it except the up-river ranch was sold, subject to the confirmation of the court.

A. M. Pringle was the highest bidder for the corner at Wall and Oregon streets, at \$3850. A. G. Brook of Seattle, who already owns property here, bought the corner at Nevada and Bond streets for \$4750. The White homestead, which includes Pilot Butte, was sold to Ralph Poladexter, who bid \$6000. No satisfactory bid was received for the up-river property and it was not disposed of.
