BRICK WORK COMPLETED
 New Building to be Occupied After First of the Year.
 All the brick work on the two-story building being erected by the Deschutes Investment Company and the one-story building of the R. M. Smith Clothing Co., has been completed. The inside work on the Smith block is farther along and it is expected that by January 1 or soon thereafter it will be ready for occupancy. It is probable that the Knights of Pythias will hold their New Year's Eve ball there, before the partition is put in. Work on the two-story building adjoining is not as far advanced and it will be February 1 or later before it is ready for occupancy.
