

WEST BUILDS OF STONE

Substantial Home Planned in Wiestoria—Other Improvements.

L. D. Wiest has recently let the contract to W. A. Beaver to furnish the stone for a residence he is erecting for his own use in Wiestoria. The house will be 28x42 feet in size and occupy lots 11 and 12 in block 43, standing about 60 feet east of the site of the homestead. Mr. Wiest plans a two-story house of pink stone with a slight use of black for trimming around the doors and windows. It will contain eight rooms and have a veranda on three sides. The contract for masonry work will be let in the near future. It is expected that two other stone residences will be erected in connection with this one.

Other improvements which have been recently completed in Wiestoria make this one of the most thoroughly up to date sections of the city. A sidewalk has been completed on Eighth street, water mains have been laid throughout the addition, the streets are sufficiently lighted, and the houses are all officially numbered. In addition new wires for telephone service have been strung and service will be given as soon as the new exchange is in operation.

O-W. R. & N. TRAIN CHANGED

Southbound Freight Will Run on Sundays Instead of Mondays.

Hereafter the O-W. R. & N. Co. will run a Sunday freight train southbound on its Deschutes line between Sherman and Bend, the first one having run last Sunday. This will take the place of the regular Monday train. Southbound freight service will continue on each Wednesday and Friday as heretofore. Northbound service will be on Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday as heretofore.

This change of service from Monday to Sunday, says H. E. Lounsbury, general freight agent, will be a convenience both to the shipper and to merchants at Bend and intermediate points. Freight delivered to the company in Portland Friday and Saturday will be in Bend in time for delivery on Monday morning.

RANCH CHANGES HANDS.
The McKinney ranch situated about 15 miles west of town has recently been sold by the Cascade Gas & Electric Fixture Co., of Tacoma, its former owners, to A. R. Thompson of Tacoma. There are 735 acres in the tract and the consideration was \$20,000. The ranch has been heretofore conducted as a stock farm but it is understood that the new owner will put it for sale in 40-acre tracts. It is under the Three Creek irrigation system. Henkle & Ryan were the brokers in the transaction.

FIRE IN REDMOND HOTEL.
Fire starting in the bar room from an unknown cause threatened destruction of the Hotel Redmond at Redmond last Thursday morning about 2:30 o'clock. Only good fighting saved the entire building from destruction. The loss is given by the Spokesman as \$1500 on the bar and \$500 on the hotel, fully covered by insurance.

ALL OFFICERS RE-ELECTED.
The annual meeting of the stockholders of the Pine Forest Irrigation Company was held at the Arnold school house Saturday afternoon. The entire staff of directors and officers were re-elected to serve for another year. There was no other important business transacted.

WILL BE TRIED AT PRINEVILLE.

Robertson to the penitentiary, and who had been resisting in the Washington courts proceedings to bring them to this jurisdiction for trial, have finally lost their cases in the supreme court of the state of Washington and will now have to appear in this jurisdiction to answer the charge.

MARKET REPORT.
NORTH PORTLAND, Jan. 3.—Receipts for the week have been: Cattle 781; calves 2; hogs 2787; sheep 3712. Livestock liquidation during the last week of 1913 was light as is customary; the bulk of shippers planned to spend the holidays at home and postponed coming to market until early in the new year. The cattle trade has been showing considerable strength recently, as killers have

been busy clearing up their mid-December surplus. The demand for beef is not strong enough, however, to elevate prices on poor stuff, and only the prices of grades have advanced. Best steers sold from 7.75 to \$8.10 with the bulk at about \$7.80 to \$7.90. Butcher stock had a slow time, as supply contained very little choice material. Cows at \$6.80, heifers \$7.00, bulls \$5.50 to \$5.75 and calves \$7.50 to \$9.00 are top quotations. The wine market took a sudden upward trend and even touched \$8.00, although \$7.90 was a liberal top price for bulk prime light hogs the early part of the week. Receipts were light and Monday's run was the smallest in months, but eleven loads came into the open market Friday and tops moved freely at 8 cents. The sheep house filled up early in the week, but has been depleted since. Fancy lambs selling at \$6.35 featured. Mutton business was temporarily dull, due to short receipts and the majority of transactions consisted of mixed stuff. Generally, sheep and lambs, hogs and cattle are all on a steady basis to commence the new year.
